A Unique Saw.

Messrs. Cowan, Ellis & Co., St. John, have the sole right for the province to sell the wonderful Stanley saw (so-called). It is a fac simile of the saw used by Stanley to cut his way through the jungles of Africa during his recent exploring expedition. The saw is about 4 1/2 feet in length, 1 1/2 in. in width, and folds up into a compass of 4 by 8 inches, handles and all, and placed in a box about the size of a gentleman's dressing case. The teeth are about the size of an ordinary cross cut saw. It is made so as to be used to cut around a tree by holding a handle in each hand and working away.

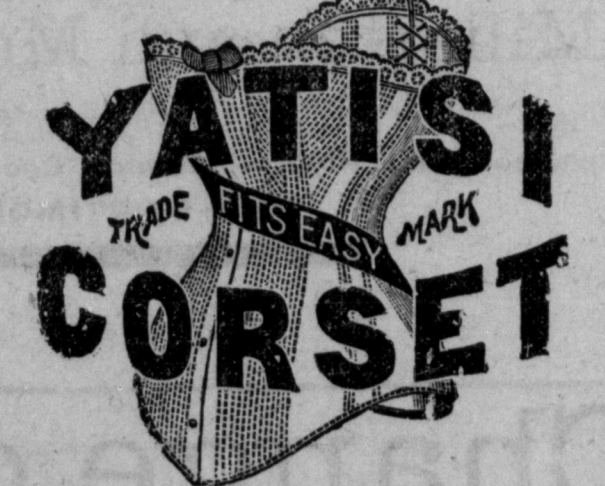

—A despatch from Capt. Connaughton announced his safe arrival in Philadelphia on Saturday.

—St. John dry goods stores close up on Friday afternoons in order to give their clerks a half holiday.

—The energetic proprietor of the Kent has erected a neat fence, which adds to the beauty of the grounds.

—The handsome sum of \$100 was realized at the auction sale and strawberry festival at Kingston last week.

—Judge Landry, Dr. Bourque and Mr. Dosthée Richard went out mackerel fishing on Thursday morning under the guardianship of Jude Robicheau.

The international steamship from St. John, Saturday, took about one hundred barrels of fresh mackerel. They were brought down on the I. C. R. from the North Shore.

—There is considerable talk about starting a paper in the interests of Liberalism on the Miramichi. The Chatham World advises them to buy one of the papers already published there.

—One of Messrs. A. & R. Loggie's fishermen, of Miramichi, with an assistant, earned \$400 catching lobsters in six weeks, at 40c. per hundred. The lobster season has been extended to the 31st in the Gulf fisheries.

—We have been enjoying almost perfect farming weather the past few weeks and consequently crops of all descriptions are doing well. It is to be hoped that our farmers will be blessed with a bountiful harvest this season, as the past two or three years have been very trying ones to them.

—The St. John barque, Mary E. Chapman, arrived here from Brazil on Monday, having had a very hard voyage through sickness. Capt. Kyffin and one of the crew were buried at sea, having succumbed to yellow fever contracted while the vessel was in the port of Santos, Brazil. The present captain and first mate are both sons of the former captain and owners of the vessel.

—James Little, sixty-five years of age, while chopping at Coal Branch on Thursday, was struck by a falling tree, breaking his arm near the shoulder, cutting his head badly and bruising him terribly. Not coming home to tea Mrs. Little started out to look for him, finding him a short distance from the place of the accident. Help was immediately summoned, but he only lived about an hour after getting to the house.

—James W. Forbes, father of Ald. Forbes of Moncton, died on Saturday at the advanced age of 86 years. Deceased was one of the early settlers of Moncton, having lived there almost continually for over fifty years. He was a ship joiner by trade, but was not engaged in active work for a number of years. Mr. Forbes was one of the men who agitated for and obtained the ten hour system in 1853, ship-building being the principal industry in Moncton at that time. The hours of labor previous to that time had been from daylight till dark.

—Job Renton, an agricultural implement dealer in Moncton, was arrested Thursday morning on complaint of Weedon J. Wetmore, of Apohaqui, agent for Peter S. McNutt, of St. John, for obtaining unlawfully, fraudulently and knowingly by false pretences wagons, farm machinery, etc., to the value of over \$500. Renton was required to give a bond to Mr. McNutt, and it is alleged that Renton's bond contained the name of King Gaskin, his father-in-law. Mr. Wetmore and Mr. Grant, who is employed by him, interviewed Mr. Gaskin Wednesday and he stated he had never signed the bond, indicating that forgery had been committed. A warrant was at once sworn out and Benton arrested.

—The last number of the Educational Review contains a letter on the Crocket dismissal by Prof. J. F. McCurdy, of Toronto University. Mr. McCurdy is a native of Chatham, and a former pupil of Mr. Crocket, and closes his long letter on the subject, which is wholly without political bias, as follows:—The disposition of such a man, with his work in the past as his foundation and stimulus, with his work in the present well in hand, and his influence for the future secured, as it seemed, by the destination of Providence and the approbation of the people, was not simply a mistake but a crime. And the feeling that leaps forth from the hearts of the people in answer to it is not merely resentment at cruel injury done to their friend and to the friend of their children, it is the solemn sense that the foul transaction is a public misfortune and a national disgrace.

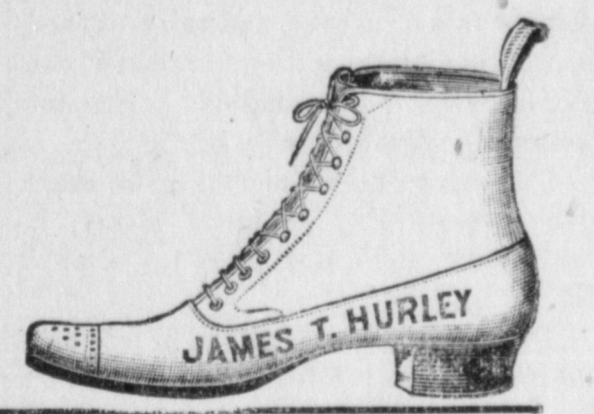
