DIXIE. The Treatment of Dandruff.

Dr. Edward Clarke, in the Lancet, states that he has had good results in persistent dandruff from the following treatment: The scalp should first be thoroughly washed with soap and hot water and then thoroughly dried with a warm aud soft cloth; there should then be rubbed into the scalp a glycerole of tannin, of the strength of ten to thirty grains to the ounce. Very obstinate cases will require the highest strength of tannin. This process should be repeated twice a week at first, once a week afterwards. If tannin fails, as it will in some cases, then resort is had to resorcin. After the formation of dandruff has ceased, the head should be rubbed daily with olive oil containing, to the ounce, ten grains of carbolic acid and a drachm of oil of cinnamon.




