#### Sensational Murder Case.

MONACO, March 5.—A man and a woman were arrested here yesterday evening charged with the murder of a physician in December last. Their arrest has caused a sensation from two reasons: first, because the murder seems to have been a brutal, cowardly and entirely premeditated affair, and, second, because the crime is a direct counterpart or reproduction of the crime for which Michael Eyraud recently suffered the death penalty on the Place de la Roquette, in Paris.

From the meagre details obtained from the police of this place, who, like the continental police officials, are disposed to be as mysterious as possible over the affair, it appears that in December last the body of an English physician—a Dr. Lindemann, of Manchester—was found dead in a ravine near San Remo. The finding of the dead body was followed by an official investigation, which it was announced resulted in the authorities of San Remo coming to the conclusion that it was either a case of suicide or else that Dr. Lindemann met his death by accident through falling down the ravine some dark night while out walking. Eventually the discussion at San Remo caused by the unhappy fate of the English physician subsided, and nobody outside of police circles expected to hear any more about the case. The doctor's body, after the inquest and subsequent investigation, was taken charge of by his friends and was buried.

It now appears that the police allowed the suicide or accident theory to get abroad in order to better enable them to follow out the real theory—that of murder. It was thought likely that the murderer or murderers upon hearing that the authorities of San Remo had arrived at the conclusion that the English physician's death was caused by accident or suicide would relax their vigilance, take fewer precautions to conceal their crime and thus fall more readily into the hands of justice. This theory turns out to have been a most excellent one. From the moment the doctor's body was found the authorities of San Remo never ceased their investigation into the cause of the Englishman's death. They patiently and diligently followed up the slight clues which had aroused their suspicions, and gradually wove a net of evidence around the doctor's murderers which yesterday resulted in the arrest here of a man and a woman who are charged with having murdered Dr. Lindemann.

The woman, it appears, was of the seductive character of Gabrielle Bompard, Eyraud's mistress, and she used her bright eyes and other attractions to captivate the physician and finally to lure him to lodgings she occupied at San Remo. As to what actually took place after the woman had enticed her victim into her room little is actually known here owing to the fact that the police are not yet prepared to give all the facts to the public. However, it is concluded that the doctor, when in the woman's apartments, was drugged, murdered and robbed by the woman who had bewitched him, and that the latter was assisted in the perpetration of the crime by the man supposed to be her lover, who was taken into custody with her.

The arrests have caused much commotion here. It has been rumored that the man and woman in custody may have other similar crimes charged against them, and that the woman may have been used to lure men to their doom. In a place like this, where the finding of bodies, generally cases of supposed suicide, is not an infrequent occurrence, it is not astonishing that the wildest theories have been advanced, and that people fancy that perhaps the woman has made it a business to decoy successful players into her apartments and that there they may have been both robbed and murdered, and their bodies placed so that they would be classed as victims of ill luck at the gaming tables of Monto Carlo or elsewhere.

#### "Fake" Journals.

#### Amber.

Genuine amber is by no means so plentiful as it was some years ago, and amber cigar holders and pipe stems will probably rise in price. The genuine amber is a fossil gum, which was produced in large quantities by trees having a resinous sap, which flowed down the trunks and collected in masses at the root. It is found in the ground of marshes and other places where forests flourished in former times, and is also obtained by dredging. The German Ocean, Baltic and Black Seas formerly produced it in great quantities, but the supply is constantly decreasing, and, unless other fields are discovered, real amber will soon be scarce and costly. There is some satisfaction in knowing that the imitation is just as good in every way, so that even if the real amber gives out there need be no diminution in the number of holders for cigars or mouth-pieces for pipes. In this country comparatively little is used save for this purpose, but in India and China large lumps are in great demand, for, from some cause, an amber idol is far more highly esteemed than a golden image, and so the best amber all goes to the East to be made into gods for the pagans.—Great Divide.
