

## After the Battle.

An evidence of the deep interest taken in the last Dominion contest might be had from the large number who attended the declaration proceedings at the Court House Monday. The returning officer, C. C. Carlyle, opened the court at 2 p. m., proceeding to count the ballots, when the following was given as the official returns:

The returning officer therefore declared Dr. E. H. Leger the successful candidate. In the absence of Dr. Leger, through serious illness, J. D. Phinney, M. P. P., read telegrams from Dr. Leger and his physician. The doctor telegraphed that he very much regretted he could not be present and thanked all those who had worked and voted for him, and said he would be the representative of all and would do all in his power to advance the interests of the whole County. Mr. Phinney continuing said now that the election was over he hoped the electors would forget any unpleasantness that had arisen during the campaign. The Conservative party had good reason to be well pleased with the result as the Government had been handsomely sustained. He had on personal grounds advised Mr. LeBlanc not to enter the field opposed to the Government and Dr. Leger. He believed the lowest estimate of the Government's majority was 28, but some had placed it as high as 46.

C. J. Sayre, Esq., replied for Mr. LeBlanc in a very happy vein, and kept his audience in the best of humor while he discussed the situation. He thought the people needed enlightenment and pitied them very much. He spoke of election not being legal and said if any elector wished to protest he could upset the election. He said there were some matters he might have spoken about with reference to the campaign, but was willing to let the matter rest and accept the verdict.

Mr. Phinney made a short reply and said the people were heartily sick of election petitions and protests, but said the Conservative party would be found ready and would increase the majority.

The proceedings came to a close with cheers for the candidates and the Queen.

Ran Amuck on a Mail Train.

DUBLIN, March 3.—While the Dublin mail train was nearing Castlereagh to-day a passenger named Gavin suddenly drew a knife and commenced slashing those about him, at the same time yelling at the top of his voice. The car was loaded with passengers and all were thrown into a panic. Gavin badly wounded five fellow-passengers, and only desisted from his bloody work when both blades of his knife were broken and the weapon was harmless. He then jumped from the train while it was going at full speed, ran to a woods near by and hid himself. The wounded passengers were taken to a railroad station and several physicians attended to their injuries. The police afterward captured Gavin, who is undoubtedly insane.

Fifty Persons Killed.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 3.—A horrible railway accident occurred near Morshansk, in the government of Tambov, to-day. Two express trains came into collision, demolishing the carriages of both. Fifty persons were killed outright and a larger number seriously injured. The scenes about the wreck are described as sickening. Many of the bodies of the dead were literally ground into pieces, while some of the wounded, dismembered and mangled, lived for several hours in the most intense agony.

## From the Golden Gate on Foot.

ROCHESTER, March 4.—Miss Zoe Gayton the actress who is walking from San Francisco to New York on a wager of \$2,000, arrived in Rochester this afternoon. She is accompanied by W. J. Marshall and L. J. Price, who represent those who are responsible for the contest. Miss Gayton wears an ordinary black travelling dress. At first she tried the bloomer costume, but finding that it attracted too much attention, abandoned it.

With the wind at her back this morning her walking was less laborious, though she was retarded by passing through or around some large snow drifts which had fallen during the night. Miss Gayton's face is well carved, plump and swarthy. Her jet black hair was coiled and hidden beneath a jaunty brown cap. If Miss Gayton reaches New York before April 5 she will receive \$2,000 and her expenses. She has been walking since August 25.

Some imagined that this was the path of patriotism, but it was nothing of the kind. It was mean, cowardly, and unchristian, and a curse would follow.
