You Don't Tire of Them.

There are some people of whom one never tires, no matter how often one sees them or how intimate the associations may be. There is about them that air of perpetual charm and variety that makes them delightful companions. There is never any fear of finding them in a pet, or a prey to some ill-humor wholly unreasonable and unexplainable.

They are pleased when you are pleased and interested in what you have to say. They are so sympathetic that your ills and troubles become their own, and your friends become so dear to them that not for the world would they do anything to rob you of them. Sometimes with these bright natures you find the added charm of originality, when you come across such a one treasure it and preserve it as one of the pearls of your life, for seldom indeed, are talent, originality and good nature found combined in one mortal frame. A nature that is so richly endowed is three-fold talented. It has the talent of magnetism, the talent of keeping good-natured and the priceless talent of originality which, Rudyard Kipling says, is not the discovery of anything new, but is rather a new way of looking at old things. And that makes it all the more delightful.

Sole Survivor of Custer's Fight.

For many years after the Custer massacre, whenever the Seventh cavalry was paraded, or there was any mounted formation, there was presented the pathetic sight of an old cavalry charger, saddled and equipped, and led by a trooper on each side, the empty saddle telling the story of the old horse's faithfulness. He was the sole survivor found on the field of the Custer massacre. He belonged to an officer in the regiment, and watched by his master's body, although wounded in a dozen places, for days and stood, gaunt, starving, and wounded, but faithful to the dead man. The late general Sturgis, who was then colonel of the regiment, and who lost a splendid young son in the fight, issued an order that the horse should be cared for to the end of his days, as attached to the regiment, and that in all mounted formations he should be in line. He lived to a good old age.

THE WORLD OVER.

A detachment of Australian troops is expected in England to compete at the next annual Royal Military Tournament, which is fixed for May 26th and the following ten days.

At the Liverpool Dog Show "Scotland's Hero," a dog belonging to an Aberdeen gentleman, carried off five first prizes and the fifty guinea trophy. It was afterwards sold for £200.

New York city consumes \$47,000,000 a year, or the estimated drink bill of the entire state of Ohio. There are 7,887 taverns in the city licensed to sell liquor—not including drug stores. This is over a thousand more than the number of licensed saloons in the state of Wisconsin.

The strike mania has spread pretty far down in the labor scale. One Saturday night the members of a newly formed newsboy's trade union in Greenock declined to sell the Evening Times because supplies were given to boys who were not members.

A Glasgow church committee, which held a meeting after service a few nights since, got locked into the building, and were only released by a minister squeezing himself free foremost through a narrow funnel over a lofty door, to which he was hoisted by his colleagues.

A shipment of 300,000 yards of cotton cloth was sent forward from the Kingston cotton mills over the Canada Pacific railway for China last week. The total export of cotton to China from the Kingston mill during the past twelve months was two million yards.

Women were particularly successful in entering the British Royal Academy School this year. Of the 23 who were chosen 13 were women and 10 men.

It is stated that Prince Napoleon has made a will disinheriting his son Prince Victor and indicating Prince Louis as the next emperor. Prince Napoleon is reported slightly better.

Mr. John J. Currie, of West River, was in town with a porker which tipped the scales at 857 pounds. Mr. Dougald Currie, also of West River, brought in a porker which weighed 743 lbs. Both were from the same litter, their joint weight being 1600 pounds. Thos. E. Murphy, of South Shore, Lot 65 also brought in a porker which, killed at the age of a year and nine months, tipped the scales at 733 pounds.—Charlotteville Examiner.

The news of a horrible massacre comes from Madagascar. Ramisatra, the governor of the province of Belanona, resenting a petition from the populace to the government to defend them from cruelties, massacred 278 persons, including men, women and children belonging to the leading families. The slaughter was continued for several days, and the agonies of the victims were, in many cases, protracted. Sometimes their limbs were gradually dismembered, their heads sawn off and their bodies were thrown to the dogs. Many women were outraged. The survivors were forced to erect a trophy composed of the heads of victims.
