The Funeral. OTTAWA, June 10.—The funeral of Sir John Macdonald, which took place to-day, was probably the most imposing affair of the kind ever seen in Canada. There was an immense turnout of military, judiciary, officials, members of Parliament and citizens. The head of the procession had reached St. Alban's church going via Elgin street bridge before the rear portion had left the main parliamentary building. There were deputations from Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton and other cities and towns by early trains, and the whole population of Ottawa seemed to be either in procession or on the sidewalks along the route by which it passed.

The Dragon Guards, Governor General's Foot Guards and 43rd Battalion led the way. The members of the cabinet acted as pall-bearers and the mourners were Sir John's son and grandson, Lieutenant Col. Macpherson, deceased's nephew, and Professor Williamson, his brother-in-law. The Governor General and suite came after the mourners. Quebec province was represented by Lieut. Governor Angers; Nova Scotia, by Lieut. Governor Daly; New Brunswick, by Attorney General Blair and Solicitor General Pugsley. Then followed the speaker, officers and members of the Senate, the sergeant-at-arms carrying the mace. Then came the consular corps, members of the civil service, lawyers, representatives of political societies and citizens on foot and in carriages.

When the procession left the church on its way to the railway depot a heavy down-pour of rain caused much discomfort and caused many to seek shelter. The funeral train, which consisted of four parlor cars heavily draped, left for Kingston shortly after four o'clock. A large number of members will leave by another special train to-morrow morning to be present at the interment.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 11.—The mortal remains of the late Sir John A. Macdonald were committed to their last resting place in Cataragui cemetery, which becomes an historic spot, and thousands in coming days will make pilgrimages here to view the resting place of Canada's great governmental ruler. The day was hot and the sun shined brilliantly. Rain came down vigorously after six o'clock, but did not interfere with the proceedings. The entire morning was spent in viewing the remains in City Hall. Twenty thousand persons in double lines passed the bier. The procession was the largest ever seen on Kingston streets. It was over two miles in length and was 40 minutes in passing a given point. The procession moved at 2.45 o'clock. At this time three miles of Princess street were lined with spectators and not less than forty thousand persons viewed the solemn advance. The procession was under civic control, stores were closed and draped in a manner fully evincing the intense sorrow manifested in the old historic city of the distinguished statesman. The order of march was as follows:

Governors and staff of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Archbishops and members of Cabinet. Speaker of the Senate. Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity. Members of the House of Commons. Members of the Provincial Executive Councils. Speakers of Legislative Councils and Members. Speakers of Legislative Assemblies and Members. Consuls of Foreign Powers. Deputy Ministers. Officers of Militia, Mayor and Corporation of Kingston. Deputations from Cities and Towns. Citizens and Carriages.

The Masons made a great turnout, 318 strong. Among the distinguished Masonic representatives were J. Ross Robertson Grand Master, and several ex-Grand Masters. The Pall bearers were members of the Cabinet, and Hon. C. J. Atkins, ex-Lieut. Governor of Manitoba. The mourners were represented by Hugh J. Macdonald, Prof. Williamson, Col. J. P. McPherson, Geo. S. Parker, Dr. Powell, Fred White and Jos. Pope, private secretary. The guards which extended down the entire line were composed of men of 'A' battery, field battery, and 14 Prince of Wales Own Rifles infantry. The men carried their arms reversed. Sir Alex. Campbell, Lieut. Governor of Ontario, Hon. Oliver Mowat, Sir Roderick Cameron of New York, and Commander Law of the Royal Navy were in one carriage. Archbishop Cleary and Rev. Dr. Wardrop of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church with attending priests and clergymen followed in separate carriages. The men in line numbering 7000 stepped off at a slow pace to the music of a Bat-

tery and 14th P. of W. Rifle Bands. The solemn strains floated back as the cortege moved slowly on to the cemetery and in a few minutes the thousands of spectators who had proceeded to the cemetery by rail could see the glistening helmets of cavalymen as they reached the top of the hill and descended the dusty roads towards the little village of Cataragui, the streets of which were lined by villagers to see the great event. The soft green sward and beautiful foliage of the trees contrasted artistically with beds of bright flowers which dotted the hillside here and there where the graves were located.

As the procession passed through, the throng of people bowed with uncovered heads and now and then a stifled sob of regret was heard. The hearse was flanked by eighty attily men who on arriving at last reposing place reverently lifted the remains of Canada's great statesman and carried the casket to the grave. As Archbishop Jones stepped forward in his clerical robes, the harsh rattle of timber was heard as the workmen uncovered the grave and there was scarcely a dry eye in the large surrounding multitude as the casket was lowered into its last resting place. Hugh Macdonald, Prof. Williamson and J. A. Chapleau were prominent at the edge of the grave and their sorrow was plainly visible. Impressive and affecting was the beautiful burial service of the church of England as read by Archbishop Jones. 'Earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust. It came solemnly from the prelate's lips followed by the benediction, and Canada's greatest man was in his long last resting place. The grave was then sealed by several large pieces of stonework set in the sides to make it perfectly safe. The cavity was filled in with floral tributes placed around it. The crowd slowly dispersed and as if to fittingly close the last scene of his great career a brilliant rainbow circled around the eastern sky through the sprinkle of rain then falling and nature seemed to naturally say: 'Peace to his ashes.'

The tolling of bells, the booming of minute guns, the strains of the dead march rendered this historic June day inexpressibly gloomy. Hundreds of the old inhabitants who had known the premier from childhood wept like children.
