**The McLeod Will Case.**  
This well known case in which Mr. J. J. Pierce, of Chatham, is one of the heirs at law, was carried before the Supreme court of Nova Scotia on appeal and has been decided against the heirs at law. It will in all probability now be carried to a higher court.

**Canada's International Exhibition.**  
The Exhibition Association, of St. John, N. B., have now announced the date for their exhibition, for the present year, and are pushing forward the work of organization with a view to excel their success of last year. The exhibition will open on the 23rd September and continue until October 3rd and the Association already have assurance of exhibits from many of those who took part in exhibition of 1890. A number of new features are to be introduced and "Special Attractions" will be particularly entertaining. The prize list will cover about the usual lines, and amount to about \$12,000.

**Hymeneal.**  
Trinity Church, Dorchester, was crowded on Wednesday afternoon, 21st inst., on the occasion of the marriage of Miss Mary Peck, eldest daughter of the late J. P. Peck, and granddaughter of John Hickman, Esq., to Walter E. Buck, of Truro. The ceremony was at five o'clock. The bride was given away by her grand-father, Mr. John Hickman, and was attended by her sister, Miss Flossie Peck and Miss Delta Buck, sister of the groom. The groom was supported by Mr. Daniel Holmes, formerly of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax, at Dorchester. The marriage service was read by Rev. J. Roy Campbell Rural Dean.

**Warm Weather in the West.**  
ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 22.—Yesterday was the warmest January day experienced in Minnesota and the Dakotas for 21 years. Three years ago 107 people were frozen in the snow drifts of Dakota, while yesterday the thermometer ranged from 62 to 82 in the shade.

At Minio, N. D., a big basket picnic was held, the young women wearing white summer dresses and carrying palm leaf fans. At other points there were base ball games and tennis matches.

There is not a particle of snow at any point 500 miles west of St. Paul, and the fear is expressed that the ground will contain little moisture in the spring and it will be in a bad condition for the plough.

**A Well-Managed Institution.**  
The Bank of New Brunswick has changed the date of its annual meeting, and its statement submitted yesterday was for eight months only. The profits for the year were, however, given, and were \$111,442, almost twenty-two per cent of capital. The shareholders got twelve per cent. of a dividend, and the rest was increased in the eight months from \$400,000 to \$450,000. The capital stock of the bank is \$500,000, but the net profits on hand at the close of 1890 were \$508,356. These figures have their effect on the public mind in valuing the shares of the institution. They afford evidence generally of prudence, care and skill with which the bank has been managed, and calculated to make the non-stockholder envious.—Globe.

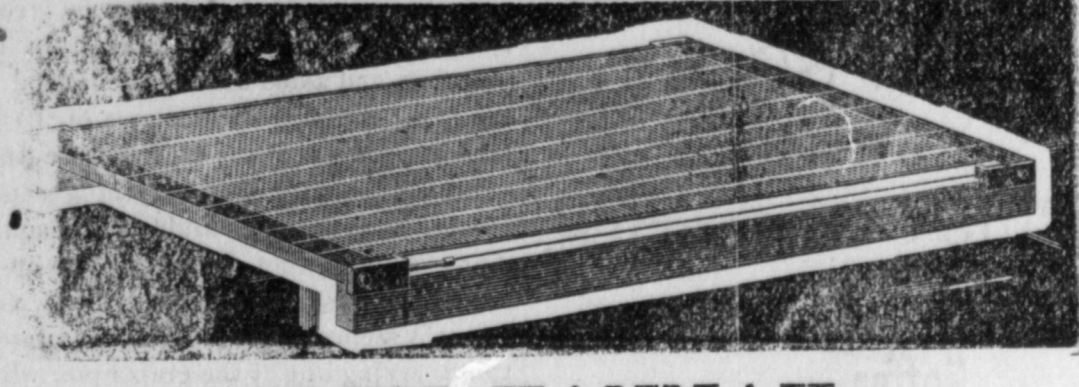
