The wheels passed over his left arm and it had to be amputated. He was also badly cut about the head.

While two friends named Pierson and Gauthier were returning from a funeral at Montreal on Wednesday they went into a saloon and getting into a row, Pierson struck his companion a blow on the head. Gauthier fell to the ground and expired instantly.

A young miller of St. Rannad, Bell-chasse, Quebec, met his death under tragic circumstances. It seems that he was doing repairs to the mill when he slipped and fell into the mill-race and after being horribly mangled by the wheels was drowned.

Edward Long, of Ludlow, Northumberland County, met with an accident a short time since. He was felling a tree and it struck another in falling and slipped back catching his leg between the knee and the ankle crushing the bone. It is not yet known whether amputation may be necessary.

The Baie des Chaleurs railway, over which a great fight is to take place at Ottawa next session, owing to the threat of Mr. Mercier to cancel its charter, was a well subsidized road. From the Dominion and Provincial governments it had bonuses aggregating \$906,000, and it is estimated that construction would cost only \$660,000.

From the opening to the close of navigation last season there were shipped 315,382 boxes of cheese from Montreal to the Bristol, Eng., Market. From advices received from that market, the Canadian make established itself as better than the United States, commanding a higher price, and was more ready of sale.

The experiment in telepherage, or the transmission of parcels by electricity along overhead wires, has so far been confined to short distances; but it is now to be tried on a large scale between Buenos Ayres and Montevideo, a distance of 186 miles. It is intended to despatch letter boxes between the two cities every two hours.

Rogersville Notes.
During the past week unusually large quantities of pulp wood, hemlock bark, and cedar wood was shipped from here. The principal shippers being Messrs. Curran & Dwyer, M. Amos, J. D. Buckley, John Maloney and A. V. White.

On Saturday last P. O. Inspector King was in town inspecting the premises to which the office is soon to be removed; We learn that he is well pleased with the room and that the transfer will be made at an early date. It is to be hoped that Mr. Thibideau will prove as competent and painstaking an official as the present incumbent, Mr. Fountain, who has held the office for a number of years.
