—The army worms are playing havoc with the marshes in Granville, N. S. It is stated that they have left some of the marshes as bare as thought fire had swept over them.

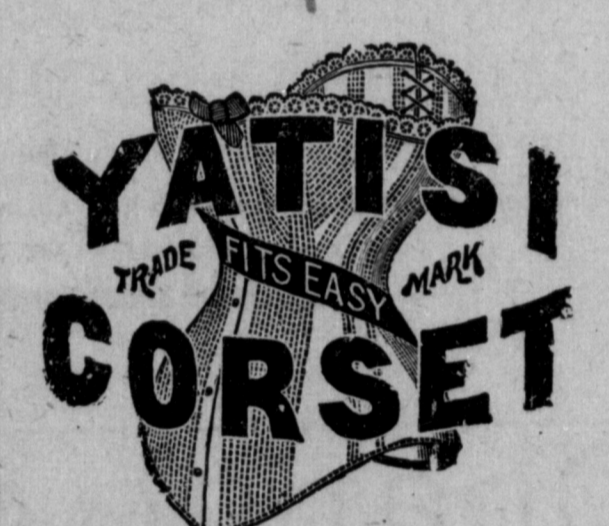

—Messrs. Miller, Thurber, Wathen and Dunn came up from the Adogwaasook fishing grounds, on Friday, where they had been spending some days at the club house, on Tweedie Brook, Kouchibouguac, which is, by the way, one of the best trout fishing privileges in the province. Owing to the inclemency of the weather they were unable to return by water and remained in town until Monday, when they proceeded to their homes in Welford, via the K. N. R. The two canvas canoes, in which they came down the river to the club house, presented a very pretty appearance, and are something new in these waters. They are built of cedar battens with ash ribs, all copper fastened, covered with about 16 ounce canvas, 16 feet long, 40 inches wide, 11 inches deep amidships. They are propelled by oars, paddle, or sail. They have centre board, 24 x 15 inches, and a drop rudder which acts as centre board also. The rig of sails used for them are called the latteen batten sails, mainsail stepped in the bow and mizzen just behind the cockpit, they are very complete and can be reefed without moving from the seat in the stern. The cockpit is 9 feet long, 20 inches broad at stern, 32 inches broad amidships, and goes to a point in the bows, the balance of boat is decked over with canvas. One is named Jessie, belonging to Mr. J. Miller, the other is Jean, belonging to Mr. W. G. Thurber.

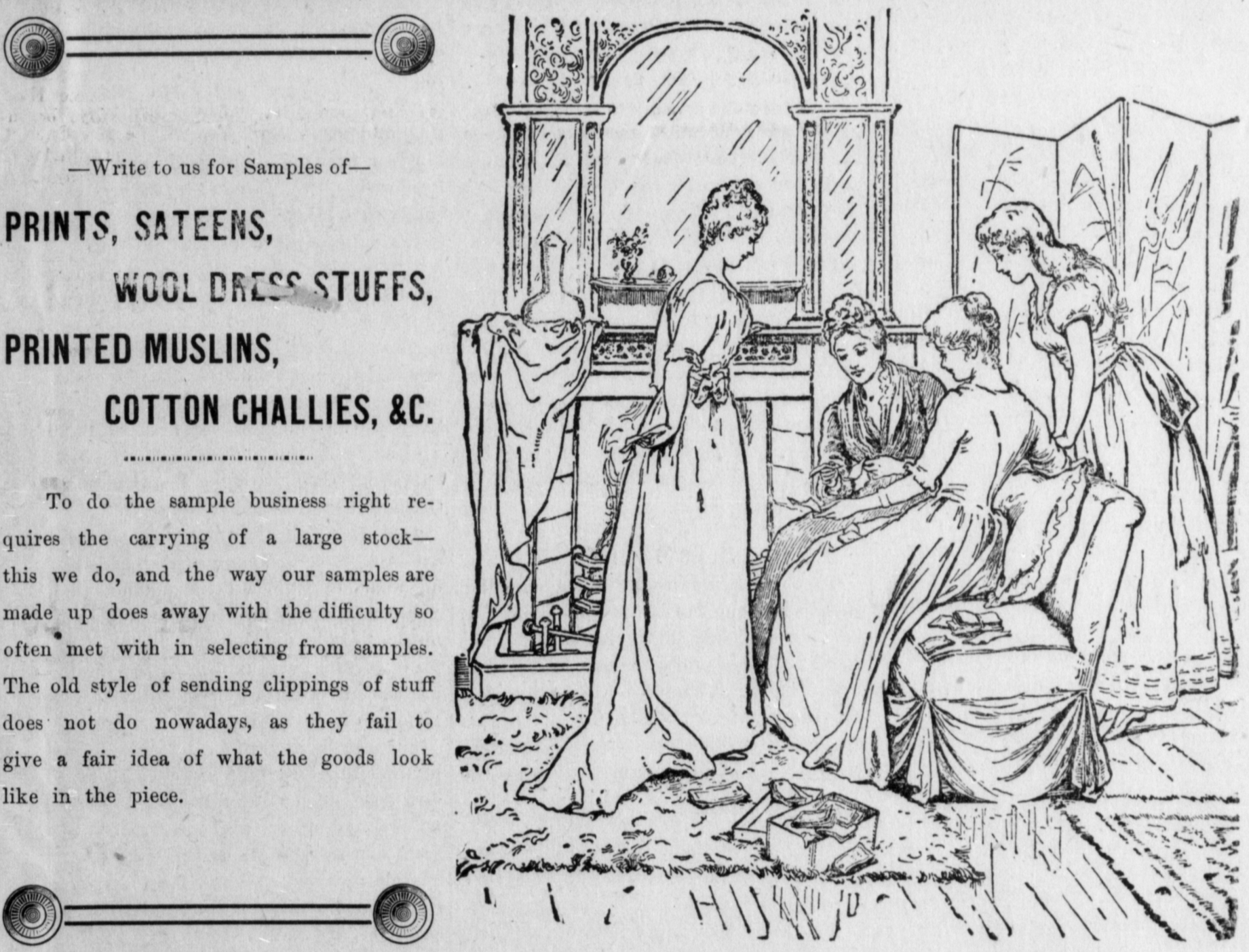
