CATTLE SHIPPING AND DECKLOAD QUESTION.

The enquiry concerning the methods employed at Montreal in the shipping of cattle and in their transport across the ocean, has closed. The investigation seems to have been a searching one, Mr. Plimsoil being present as at liberty to push enquiry in every direction he might deem necessary or even desirable. The evidence in the question under consideration. The general result seems to be that while it has been made to appear that grossly exaggerated reports had reached Mr. Plimsoil, and had met with a ready reception by him, and while it has been made evident that the legislation proposed to be enacted by the Imperial legislature in regard to the cattle export trade would much damage an important Canadian industry, and is quite uncalculated for by the real facts of the case, it has been disclosed that improved methods of shipment and of care-taking on passages are practicable and required. Good is therefore likely to ensue from the enquiry. Cattle shippers have had brought home to them a sense of their short comings at various points, and Mr. Plimsoil has had read to him another lesson as to the necessity of being more on his guard against flaming reports as to the limits of grievances which he may wish to suppress.

The enquiry closed at Montreal on one branch of Mr. Plimsoil's mission is to be resumed at St. John on the other, dealing with the deck load matter.

The question is important, and the fullest knowledge thereon by all concerned is much to be desired.

Whatever precautions and restrictions are shown to be absolutely necessary for the safe carriage of deck loads should be enforced after exhaustive enquiry, but restrictions should not be imposed to the smallest extent beyond the limits manifestly essential. It is to be hoped the information on the subject still deemed needful may be acquired in St. John. The matter must be well understood by the many shippers of lumber in St. John and at other lumber shipping ports in the Province.

THE MUCH VAUNTED CONSUMPTION-CURE.

Medical men most fully posted in the facts connected with Dr. Koch's celebrated consumption-cure, appear somewhat to regret the untimely haste manifested in bringing that eminent man's discoveries to the notice of the general public. It appears that the discoveries can scarcely be considered complete, and that the method of lymph preparation had not passed beyond its experimental stage when the veil was uplifted. Exaggerated expectations were raised, vastly larger claims than were warranted by the facts were put forth and accepted by many severely afflicted people. Painful disappointment has resulted and must result. The matter has been more discriminatingly dealt with by Professor Cornil, an eminent Parisian doctor, than by other believers in the merits of the celebrated cure.

The Professor has recently delivered a series of lectures on the Koch treatment of tuberculosis, and promises to speak even more definitely on the subject a month hence. He holds that lymph injection in many cases of skin consumption is effective, but he pronounces against that injection for lupus in cases where lung consumption complicates the condition. In bone and joint affections the lymph sometimes operates beneficially, sometimes the reverse. In throat affections the lymph with surgical skill combined promises well. In advanced cases of pulmonary consumption the lymph is useless and in acute pneumonic phthisis. In cases in which consumption seems to have been arrested, injection would revive the action of the dormant bacilli. Upon the whole he decides almost entirely to abandon the use of the Koch method in treatment of lung consumption. Generally speaking the tone of the learned professor in discussing the great German's discoveries is discouraging. But some considerable time must yet elapse before the true value of the far famed lymph can be considered settled beyond doubt. Meanwhile much dissatisfaction is being expressed as to the secrecy observed in regard to the method used in lymph manufacture. Dr. Koch, it is said, has left the disclosure to the discretion of the State authorities.

BLAINE'S INTEREST IN THE SEAL QUESTION.

It is being charged or insinuated in some

United States journals that Mr. Secretary Blaine has a personal pecuniary interest in the Behring Sea seal fishery. If the charge can be sustained the damage to Mr. Blaine's political influence must be heavy. But there may be nothing in the charge beyond party malignity. Partisan accusations against prominent public men in the United States are prolific. All of them require to be taken with large grains of salt. Party warfare in the republic is exceedingly unscrupulous in its choice and use of weapons. In this case it is sought to be made out in a round about fashion that Mr. Blaine has large interests in the commercial company in behalf of whose seal fishing monopoly the United States Government claims to jurisdiction over the waters of the Behring Sea seems to be urged.

THE HOME RULE SPLIT.

At the moment of writing, the split in the Home Rule ranks in Ireland does not appear to have entered a new phase. It is understood that Mr. W. O'Brien at Mr. Parnell's suggestion is consulting Mr. McCarthy as to his withdrawal from the leadership to which he was elected by the seceders from Mr. Parnell's guidance. Mr. Parnell's wishes that Mr. W. O'Brien should take Mr. McCarthy's place. Of course that involves Mr. Parnell's retirement from the Home Rule front. A short time will show whether or no the split is to be perpetuated. The Imperial Parliament re-assembles in a few days' time, and then at least, if not before the leadership question will have to be settled among the Home Rule members of Parliament.

The Moqui Snake Dance.

"Benjamin Brink, Moqui, Ariz.," was written on the register at the Palmer House yesterday by a robust-looking man of 60, somewhat stoop shouldered.

"From what I have heard of the 'ghost dance,'" said Mr. Brink, "I cannot see why it should stir up such a row. The 'snake dance,' I believe, is ten times more exciting, and the Zuni, Navajo, and Moqui Indians on the reservation near my home work themselves into a perfect frenzy during its progress, but never think of molesting the whites.

"It is part of their religion, though, and if any attempt were made to stop it I believe there would be bloodshed. The dance takes place once in two years. The last one was celebrated in July. Preparations were made several weeks before it came off, and I was as anxious to be a spectator as they were. A stranger or wilder ceremony I never saw. I hope I shall never see it again. The dance took place just before sundown, and I got on a high ledge where I could get a good view. The space allowed for the dancers was not large, and was enclosed. Fifteen fine-looking Indians began to walk rather slowly at first around a huge stone in the center of the enclosure. They were almost naked, and every part of their bodies, even to their feet, was smeared with red and green paint. Each man had a fox's scalp dangling from his waist, and in each hand carried a rattle made of a gourd. Hoofs of deer were tied round their ankles and wrists, and at each step and movement of the arm noise enough was made to wake the dead.

"The snakes to be used in the dance had been caught several days before the fete, and just before the dance had been placed in a cluster of trees beneath where I stood. After the men had yelled till they were hoarse, and made themselves tired with stamping on the ground, fifty more painted redskins came rushing down a hill, filed into the enclosure, and then began such a tumult as I never want to hear again. At a given signal sixty-five now frantic men made a rush for the grove where the snakes were hidden. Each man came rushing back with a wriggling and squirming snake, its neck between his teeth so that it could not bite him, reentered the ring, and began a slow walk around the center stone. The reptiles hissed and dashed their tails and bodies around the necks of the apparently mad red men. Several of them were bitten by the snakes which were the most venomous in the country. It is a wonder all of the performers were not bitten. Two of them died a day or two after the dance, the herbs applied not being sufficient to draw out the poison.

"After the ceremony each man snatched his snake from his mouth, and ran down into the valley below, and there the reptiles were set free. The Indians were thoroughly exhausted after their violent exercise, and could scarcely crawl back up the hill. From what I could learn such ceremonies as the 'snake dance' have been held for centuries."—Ex.

Miss Edna Northrup, daughter of C. E. Northrup, had the side of her face and right arm very severely burned on Saturday evening, from the explosion of a bottle of kerosene oil which she was using in kindling a fire. The consequences might have been a good deal more serious had it

not been for the prompt action of her sister, who wrapped a cloak about her and smothered the fire which had caught in her clothing.—Moncton Times.

John Stinson, who lives at St. Clair siding, 30 miles east of Windsor, Ont., was arrested for counterfeiting American money. His sons William and James, the hired man named Stoddard and Mrs. Doodley, the house keeper, were also arrested. The family are said to be in the counterfeiting business for 20 years.
