"The Indian agents," said a well-informed woman who has spent much of her life in the far West, "when they do not steal, distribute supplies to the tribes in a most reckless fashion. I remember on one occasion a consignment of white felt hats was to be distributed to a tribe near our station, and the agent, instead of seeing that each member of the tribe received a hat, handed over a pile of a dozen to one of the chiefs, who supposing they formed one highly ornate hat, the tops sitting closely into each other, gave them to his favorite squaw, who, in turn, placed the whole dozen upon the head of her eldest boy. The effect was ludicrous enough, but when we consider that eleven suffering men went through the winter with bare heads in consequence, the joke was not altogether so laughable as the agent seemed to think."

The coasts of Belgium, Holland and North Germany are blocked with ice. At Port aux Haven, North Germany, several vessels have been struck by immense masses of floating ice and their hulls badly damaged. The boats rapidly filled and soon went to the bottom, and in every instance the crews were saved from death with great difficulty. At Antwerp ten thousand workmen have been thrown out of employment owing to the unusually severe weather prevailing. In northern Italy snow began to fall on Wednesday and did not cease till Friday. The inhabitants of that region are suffering acutely. Such weather is entirely unknown to them. There have been heavy snowfalls in Spain. A violent storm accompanied by hail and snow, extending a long distance inland, is reported from the seaport of Algiers, North Africa. A number of persons have been frozen to death in France.

Among the very queer imports this week were 100 packages of molasses a leading Bangor firm received from Halifax. The importation of molasses here is not very remarkable, but it was never before brought from Halifax. There is always something new under the sun.—Bangor Commercial.

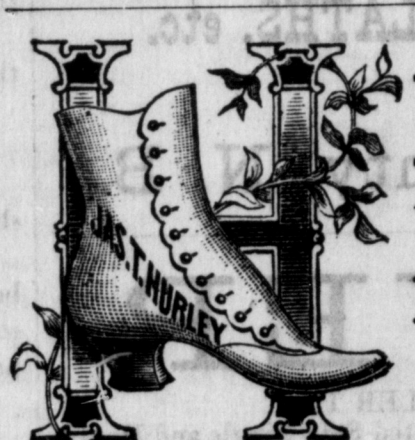

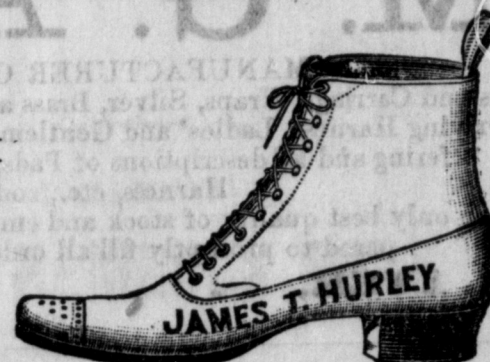
