Cocagne.

August 10, 1891.—It is with sincere regret that your correspondent is called upon to chronicle the sudden and much lamented death of Mr. Josiah Gamble, a well known resident of the parish of Notre Dame. The announcement of his sudden death startled the entire community and produced a deep and prevailing sensation of sorrow. We draw a veil over the remorse which his death must have caused to the afflicted relatives, and especially to his young family, who, it will be remembered, were so unfortunate as to lose their mother a little over a year ago, but if public sympathy can tend to soothe their present anguish, we feel assured they will possess the source of consolation in no ordinary degree. To the bereaved family we extend our heartfelt sympathy as the dark clouds of sorrow hang so heavily over them, and fervently pray that the God of the Fatherless may wipe the tears off all eyes, and be to them an ever present help and comforter in these the weary days of their great affliction.

The Beaton brothers, two leading members of the prospecting committee that has recently been formed in Moncton, were here lately, in the interests of the association. It won't do to be too sanguine, however, for very likely we'll be fully informed as to the "probabilities" before the expiration of the present month.

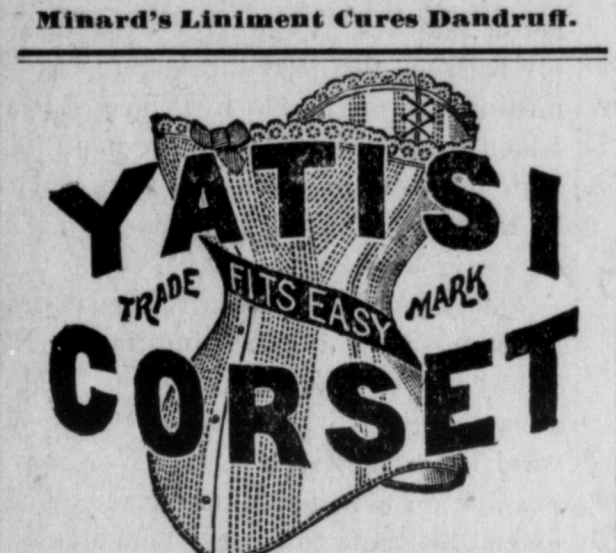
