bruised and the clothing badly torn. The  
deceased was about 80 years old.

—Two hundred people were either  
killed or injured as a result of a railway  
collision at St. Maude, France, on Sunday.

others drowned by firemen, who were  
summoned to extinguish the fire.

—The body of Miss Ethel Allen, one of  
the victims of the sad drowning accident  
that occurred at St. John on the 24th of

the ground. He displayed wonderful  
fortitude, and walked half a mile to the  
camp. His sufferings were intense. A  
physician was sent for, but could give no  
aid. Whalen died at one o'clock Sunday  
morning. He was 26 years of age, and  
belonged to Miramichi.
