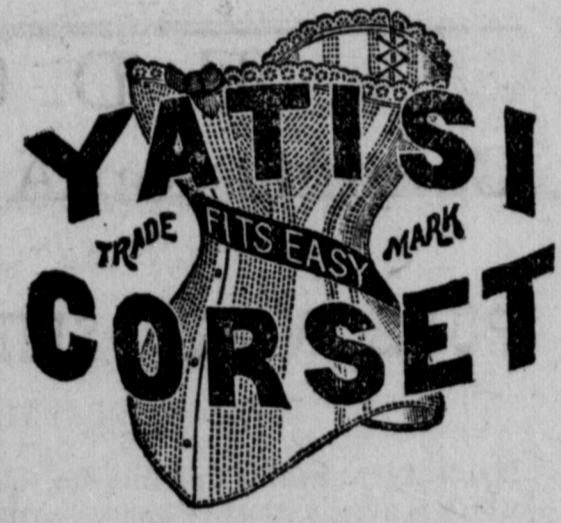

In the past six months there were 189 births in Norristown, and 163 of these were females.

During the year 1890 61,435 persons emigrated from Ireland, a falling off of 9,365 from the average. Of these emigrants 52,685 went to the United States, against an average for the four preceding years of 61,785.

It is almost conceded Her Majesty will turn to Canada and Australia for an arrangement similar to the commercial treaty heretofore existing between Hawaii and the United States.
