

Local Legislature.

FREDERICTON, March 19, 1891. Mr. Wilson's bill on liens was referred to a special committee composed of Messrs. Wilson, Phinney, Murray, Shaw and Atkinson.

Mr. Alward made his motion re expenses of the lunatic asylum commission. He said the expenses of the commissioners the year before last were \$456; last year the expenses were \$840.

Dr. Atkinson made his motion for a statement showing the amounts due any bank or banks, etc. Mr. Blair said the information would be furnished so far as possible.

The House then went into committee of supply, and Mr. Alward entered into a criticism of the government's finances. He was followed by Messrs. Pugsley, Powell, Wilson, Burchill, Phinney and McQueen.

Mr. Keown made his motion as to quantity of logs and other lumber returned by scalers, etc. Hon. Mr. Mitchell—Any information not contained in the surveyor general's report (to be submitted in a day or two) will be furnished without address.

Mr. Stockton asked whether the report of the Lunatic Asylum would be submitted. Hon. Mr. Mitchell said he thought it would be ready early next week.

The House in committee resumed consideration of supply, Dr. Lewis in the chair. On the item of \$70,000 for bye-roads, Mr. Stockton complained that the accounts connected with great road expenditures in St. John had not been accompanied by vouchers.

Hon. Mr. Blair said Mr. Balcom had been sent for. He also said he held in his hand the voucher for \$1,378, Mr. Roger Connolly's account, in connection with the Red Head work, spoken of by Mr. Stockton.

There was a general discussion, after which the item was passed, and the House adjourned. FREDERICTON, March 23.—Mr. Perley gave notice for a statement of persons to whom the date in which the sum of \$1,384 mentioned on page 104 of the auditor general's report for this year as paid by warrant 121 was originally paid, and to whom said warrant was made payable, and the name of the commissioner or other person who expended the same, and the roads and bridges, or other works or services respectively on which the said sum was expended, and to whom paid for the performance of such work and services for the same.

Recess. FREDERICTON, March 24.—When the House in committee of supply on Monday afternoon, took up the item of proposed expenditure for the care of government house, and to make repairs.

Mr. Stockton read from the debates of 1889 to show that the government at that time stated that no further expenditure would be asked on account of government house as an official residence.

The item passed. Replying to Mr. Stockton, Hon. Mr. Blair said the government had not surrendered its claim to the old penitentiary property.

When the item of \$6,500 for steam navigation was under consideration, Mr. Alward urged for the restoration of the grants to the Basin of Minas and Yarmouth services, which were cut off last year, and was supported by other St. John members.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell said the granting of subsidies to these services was only temporary and it was announced in 1888 that the grants would be discontinued after 1889. He could not hold out any inducements that the grants would be restored.

Answering Mr. Burchill, Hon. Mr. Mitchell said that provision had been made for the service on the Miramichi. The item passed. The item for lunatic asylum maintenance, \$40,000, was next moved. Mr. Stockton protested against considering this item in the absence of the report of the medical superintendent of the asylum.

Messrs. Alward, McQueen, Stockton, Powell, Pugsley and Mitchell, the item passed. Answering Mr. Poirier's motion Hon. Mr. Ryan said it was the government's intention to complete the Seal Brook bridge and to have the measurement taken during the coming summer at Little Tracadie bridge.

Mr. Burchill introduced a bill adding to and further amending chapter 99 of the Consolidated Statutes of municipalities. Hon. Mr. Mitchell submitted a return in answer to Mr. Hanington's motion, showing the bank balances, etc.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell also submitted returns in answer to Mr. Hanington's motion for a statement of warrants issued from January 1st to the 14th of March. House adjourned at 1.30 o'clock a.m.

The collector of customs at Gloucester, Mass., has been informed by Assistant Secretary Spaulding, that imported frozen fish intended for bait and not immediately sold and distributed to fishermen, may be exempt from duty under the provisions of the free list relating to "fish for bait," provided the collector is satisfied that the fish are intended for use as bait and nothing else.
