DEDHAM, Mass., June 3.—Late last night the murdered body of Miss Mary Emmerson was found in a closet in her house at the western part of the town having been strangled. Two Germans one named Hoffman and the other only known as August boarded with Miss Emmerson. August cannot be found and is suspected to have committed the murder the object of which is supposed to have been robbery. Miss Emmerson was 65 years old and highly esteemed. August is 26 years old and came from St. John, N. B., a short time ago.

Boston, June 3.—The mangled remains of a man were found this morning on the tracks of the draw of the Charles River Bridge. The arms were cut off, the head badly mashed and the body and legs twisted out of shape. He had doubtless crawled under the bridge to sleep and had not been observed when the bridge was opened to allow a vessel to pass through. A peculiar circumstance is that the man closely follows the description of "August" who is supposed to have killed Miss Emmerson in Dedham.

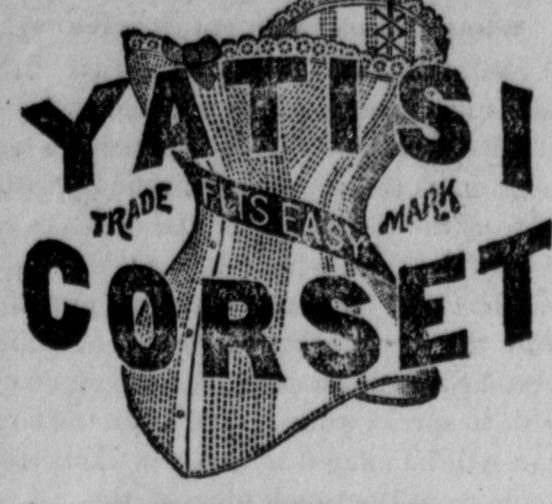
