THE WORLD OVER.

There wasn't another table that got the service that that table got, and the waiter was finally rewarded with the other half of the bill.—New York Sun.

The new house of Baring has been materially strengthened by the accession of Sir George Stephen and Sir Donald Smith and other members of the great syndicate which created the Canadian Pacific Railway. They have taken up a large shareholding interest.

A warrant was issued at Montreal on Thursday on the instance of Rev. Father Paradis against John Lewis, deputy collector of customs, on a charge of refusing to give up invoices on some pictures which came from Rome consigned to a Montreal broker, but which were for Rev. Father Paradis. A certain sum was demanded as duty. This was refused; hence the trouble.

The new Archbishop of York, Dr. Magee, formerly Bishop of Peterborough, is the first Irishman who has ever become Primate of England.

Six blocks in the town of Cynet, Ohio, were burned Friday morning. Three persons perished in the flames, while several others are missing. The loss exceeds \$100,000; little or no insurance.

It is reported that a farmer in Holt county, Kansas, has 26 living children, all of whom are unmarried and live at the homestead.

The Winona Paper Company of Holyoke, Mass., has suspended payment. The liabilities amount to nearly \$600,000.

The Farmers' bank, of Augusta, Kansas, with a capital of \$25,000, and the Augusta Mercantile Company have failed.

THE WORLD OVER.

It is reported Abdurrahman Khan, ameer of Afghanistan, is dead.

An avalanche recently overwhelmed the town of Athamania, Greece, destroying 80 houses, killing 25 persons, and injuring many others.

During election riots at Gallegos, Spain, on Thursday three persons were shot and killed.

A French-Canadian farmer of St. Damien P. Q. was swindled a few days since out of \$5,000 by a well-dressed confidence man of his own nationality whose acquaintance he made on the train between Levis and Sherbrooke, and who induced him to go to New York, where he was cheated out of his money.

The Chapin mine at Iron Mountain, Mich., the largest and most productive mine in Michigan caught fire Thursday evening. The fire extended and all the shafts were closed down. 8 men are underground without any chance of escape.

The first snow storm of the New Year occurred here on Sunday last, when a sufficient amount of snow fell to make good sleighing. The want of snow during the past month has been seriously felt in both town and country districts.—North Sydney Herald.

There are some indications that Mexico would be very well pleased to improve trade relations with Canada. The *Two Republics*, a daily journal published in the city of Mexico, says: "Canada is initiating her vigorous foreign trade policy by offering to give a handsome subsidy to a line of steamers to run from Montreal to Vera Cruz: and it is quite possible that a subsidy may be asked from the Mexican government. Mexico for several years paid the old Alexandria line a good subsidy in order to insure its establishment and to encourage the then incipient trade with New York. To subsidize the Canada line now would be following the same policy—to encourage a new trade in a new field. The Alexandria line was really established by the protection of Mexico alone, for the United States never contributed one cent of subsidy. In the present instance Canada begins with a more vigorous action, and where Mexico finds liberal treatment she will not be outdone in liberality. This move on the part of Canada at this time indicates a desire to profit by the damage which the McKinley tariff has caused the trade between the United States and Mexico."

The total population of Maine is now officially fixed at 661,086, a gain of only 12,447 in ten years.

S. Burns was convicted at Merriton, Ont., on Saturday, of having asked for liquor at a hotel during prohibited hours and was fined. The conviction was made under a recent amendment to the liquor law.

Two freight trains collided near Ballantyne station, Ont., Saturday. A fireman was killed and three others slightly injured. The engines and several cars considerably damaged.

An apple tree, 70 years old, is causing comment in West Pictou. The apples have but one stalk, yet there are two and in some cases three apples grown into one another. The tree was covered with these freaks of nature.

As two men and a boy named Rippley, Steinhrope and Homer were driving a load of meat near Orangehill, the rig went down over an embankment fifteen feet into the river Credit, killing the two men and seriously injuring the boy.
