Kent Municipal Council.
JANUARY SESSION, 1891.
THURSDAY, JAN. 15, 10 A. M.
Full board present.
Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

On the attention of council being called to resolution of last July respecting collecting justices, the secretary stated that the council, or its committee should nominate the justices against whom warrants should be issued.

The clerk of the peace gave the same opinion. The Councilors F. M. Richard, Atkinson, Leger, Bernard, Peters, with the secretary, and auditor, were appointed a committee to ascertain what justices have not made returns and report thereon at next July meeting.

Resolved, that the overseers of the poor of each parish be notified to follow the law and make their returns jointly. Council adjourned until 2 p. m. At 2 p. m. council called to order. Full board present. Resolved, that the council adjourn until 10 a. m., to-morrow and that the finance committee go into session.

FRIDAY, 10 P. M.

Council called to order. Full board present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Resolved, that the secretary be instructed to request the county representatives to have enacted for Kent the Act 53 Vic. cap. 24.

Resolved, that James Murphy return to the secretary before the 1st of February next, the delinquent lists of Carleton now in his hands.

Ordered, that the following amounts be assessed on the different parishes for the support of poor for 1891:

Richibucto, \$800; St. Louis, \$200; St. Marys, \$250; Dundas, \$250; Acadieville, \$45; Weldford, \$550; Harcourt, \$60; Carleton, \$50; Wellington, \$400; St. Pauls, \$200.

Ordered, that \$15 be refunded to overseers of poor, Weldford, for taking a lunatic to the asylum.

I. B. Humphrey appointed chairman of Harcourt lock-up committee vice J. F. Dorothy, resigned.

Ordered, \$20 be assessed on Wellington, 1891, for the construction of a pound.

List of parish officers St. Louis read and approved, also St. Paul's, Weldford and Harcourt.

Ordered, that Phineas Beers, overseer of poor, Weldford, 1890, refund to overseers of the poor for Weldford for ensuing year \$3.02 extra commission taken last year.

Resolved, that the last year's list of lumber surveyors for the county be re-appointed, and Thomas P. Arseneau, Thos. Frecker, Andre H. Breau and John Garvin be added thereto.

Resolved, that the \$500 6 per cent. debenture now outstanding be called in and that amount be assessed on the county this year to pay the same.

Ordered, that \$3,000 be assessed on the county this year for contingencies in addition to the \$500 ordered to meet the 6 per cent. debenture.

Ordered, that \$1,750 be assessed on the county this year for the purpose of liquidating principal and interest on debentures issued by the municipality.

Resolved, that C. Richardson be appointed auditor for ensuing year at same salary as last year.

Council adjourned until 2 p. m.

FRIDAY, 2 P. M.

Council called to order. Full board present.

Ordered, that \$30 be assessed on Richibucto fire district for fire purposes 1891.

Ordered, that Philip E. Richard, overseer of poor, St. Marys, pay to his successors the poor money now in his hands.

Lists of parish officers for St. Marys, Carleton and Wellington read and approved. Resolved, that Councilors Leger, Peters and Atkinson be appointed a committee with the auditor to ascertain the indebtedness of the county, and make a statement thereof to this board, which statement shall be embodied in the report of municipal receipts and expenditure.

Resolved, that whereas the County of Kent, with its large population, extensive trade, and varied industries is without suitable buildings for customs and postal purposes, such as exist in the adjoining counties, therefore the Dominion Government be memorialized to make an appropriation for the purpose of securing to the county suitable buildings for the purposes above named. And further, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Dominion representative, E. H. Leger, Esq.

Ordered, that \$30 be paid to overseers of poor, Weldford, being poor money collected and paid into county treasurer by Robert McCray, collector of No. 2.

Resolved, council adjourn until 9 a. m. to-morrow.

SATURDAY, 9 A. M.

Council called to order. Full board present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Resolved, that the finance committee's report be read. Read and accepted.

Councillor Peters submitted report of committee appointed to ascertain county indebtedness, showing:

Report accepted.
Resolved, that K. B. Forbes be appointed county treasurer for ensuing year at same salary as last year.

Resolved, that the salary of inspector of licenses be one hundred dollars per annum. The inspector made a statement.

Ordered, that the secretary in issuing the assessment warrants for 1891 make the Dundas warrant on a valuation of \$13,000 less than last year, and St. Marys warrant on valuation of \$13,000 more than last year, and furthermore add \$73 to St. Marys warrant and subtract \$73 from Dundas warrant.

Ordered, that \$2 poll booth rent be paid to each of the following: John Beattie, S. S. Briggs, J. Govang, Eusebe Comeau, Narcisse Leger, Luke P. Daigle, Isaac Babineau, Clifford Atkinson, Alexander McMichael, John Cail, Asa Howell, Fred Comeau, Placide Gray, W. J. Brait and F. L. J. Richard.

Ordered, that the following persons be paid the amounts set opposite their names as chairmen of municipal elections: J. N. Wathen, \$1; Edward Owens, \$2; A. J. Arseneau, \$1.35; Joseph M. Mezeroll, \$2; George W. Raymond, \$1; W. A. Black, \$1; Joseph LeBlanc, \$1.35; Frank Daigle, \$1.35; Eusebe Comeau, \$1; Wm. Farrer, \$1.50; W. H. Warman, \$1.30; Peter S. Richard, \$1.70; James Morton, \$1; Gideon V. Leger, \$1.15; D. D. Landry, \$1; Wm. Scott, \$1.30; Peter Daigle, \$1.40.

Resolved, that hereafter district No. 3, Richibucto, be known as district No. 2, and district No. 2 be known as district No. 3.

Resolved, that poll booth No. 2, Wellington, be at Denis Ryan's.

Resolved, that Fred J. Cormier, of district No. 1, Wellington, be ordered to refund \$64.96 to county treasurer, as assessment on said district for 1890 was \$1,596.27 and not \$1,531.31, as stated in his account.

August Leger, Damien Bourgeois and Oliver S. Jones were elected valuers for ensuing term.
Council adjourned until 2 p. m.

Council called to order at 2 p. m. Full board present.

Resolved, that \$20 be allowed the inspector of licenses for office rent, and \$5 for stationery.

Resolved, that collector's book, district No. 2, Harcourt, be referred to July session.

Resolved, that the stipendiary magistrates' salaries for ensuing year be as follows: Richibucto, \$50; Wellington, \$25; Harcourt, \$25.

Resolved, that the treasurer open up an account with the Merchants Bank of Halifax at a rate of 6 per cent. interest.

List of parish officers Richibucto read and approved.

Resolved, that a valuation be taken in the county for 1891, and assessors be paid for the said work as follows:—Dundas, \$85; St. Marys, \$55; St. Pauls, \$40; Wellington, \$90; Richibucto, \$100; St. Louis, \$60; Weldford, \$80; Harcourt, \$50; Carleton, \$60; Acadieville, \$40.

Resolved, that \$50 be paid to each of the valuers.

Resolved, that the Buctouche lock-up committee make their report at July session.

Resolved, that the receipts and expenditures of this session of the municipal council be printed in pamphlet form, 400 each, French and English.

Ordered, that \$810 be assessed to meet expenses of taking valuation.
Vote of thanks to chairman.
Council adjourned sine die.
