Trouble on Board Ship.
A brutal attempt to take the life of Capt. McLean, of the barque "Claribel," lying at anchor near Charlottetown P. E. I., was made on Wednesday. Jennings the cook, who had been drinking heavily before he shipped, became discontented and wanted to leave the ship, and said he was afraid to sleep in the fore-castle. The captain allowed him to sleep in the outer cabin. Wednesday night, while the captain was in his cabin reading, Jennings crept up behind him and struck him over the head with a caulking mallet, following the blow with another which prostrated the captain. The mate rushed out, and with the assistance of some of the sailors succeeded in beating Jennings into submission. When the tug answered the half-mast flag on the barque on Thursday she found one man in irons, another sick with inflammation of the lungs, and a third a chum of Jennings out of his head, besides those who were wounded. Jennings presented a sorry sight owing to the bruises he received. No charge has been made against Jennings and the P. E. Island public are objecting to have him at large. Capt. McLean is seriously injured.

The Late Massacre.
LONDON, May 16.—The Manipur despatches were presented to parliament yesterday. They fail to clearly establish why such a small force was sent to Manipur. It seems that commissioner Quinton intended to summon the Senaputty as a rebel and to arrest him.

A native eye witness deposes that after half an hour's confab the hands and feet of each person in Quinton's party were cut off and then all were executed in the presence of 1000 Manipuris including Senaputty and the Jubra.

The News says the Manipur blue book establishes most decisively that the government is to blame for the Manipur disaster.

The other papers remark upon the meagreness of the information as regards the small force and other points in the report and Mr. Quinton and the Viceroy come in for a share of the blame—they all call for the severe punishment of the Senaputty.

Four of the original New Brunswick senators are still living, viz. Hons. Amos, E. Botsford, Abner R. McClellan, Wm. H. Odell and David Wark, while there are only three of the original Ontario senators living, three of the Quebec list and two from Nova Scotia.
