Owens' Art Institution.
We have received a pamphlet from the Owens' Art Institution, St. John, N. B., containing a plan of a general exhibition to be held of the work of all students who have attended the Institution since its opening in 1885. The annual closing exhibition of the school has been omitted this year in view of the more extensive display in September next. The students of the Owens' Art School have formed a League for the purpose of assisting in the work of inciting a greater interest in art and extending its influence. An art sale is to be held in connection with the general exhibition, one-half the proceeds of which is for the benefit of the Institution, for the purchase of art literature, the establishment of a library and for such other objects as may assist in the furtherance of art culture. One may become an honorary member of the League on payment of \$1.00 annually, a patron by the gift of \$50.00 and the gift of \$100 constitutes him a life member.

Mr. John Hammond, principal of the school is an artist of high standing. He has spent several years abroad in professional study and his work has been hung with honor in the leading art exhibitions both in Europe and America. The art gallery in connection with the school contains a fine collection of pictures, among which are many valuable paintings by noted European and American artists, together with selections from the work of students extending over five years, should form an extensive and interesting display. The Owens' Art Institution is doing good work and we wish it increased prosperity.

Terrific Whirlwind.

Bathurst advices of June 15th say: On Friday afternoon last about 2 o'clock a terrific wind visited the vicinity of Bathurst. The width of the track followed was about three miles. So far as known, the damage done was between Peter's river and Salmon beach, viz., from northwest to southwest. At Peter's river, Dominick Doucett's house was shifted about 10 or 12 inches out of place, two chimneys hurled from the roof and all his fencing razed to the ground. Following the course above described, the gale struck Youghal and Carron Point, levelling all fences en route. At Salmon Beach, several fishermen overhauling Salmon nets had narrow escapes. All their boats and canoes swamped at the outset. At Carron Point large trees were torn from the ground and a number of lesser ones were also uprooted.

The hay crop of New England is one-third less than that of last year, it is thought.

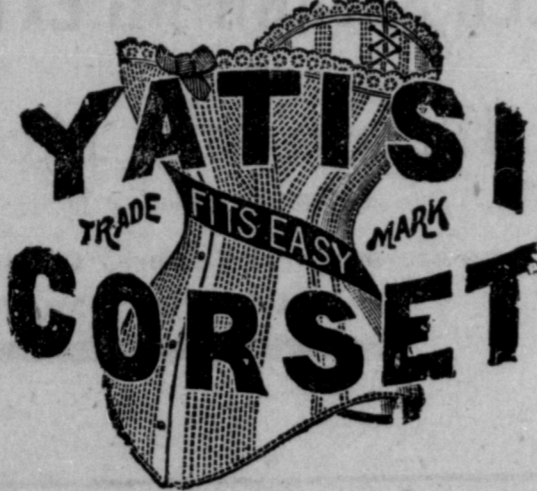

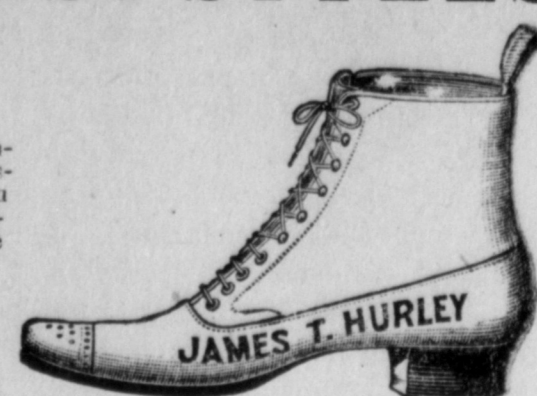

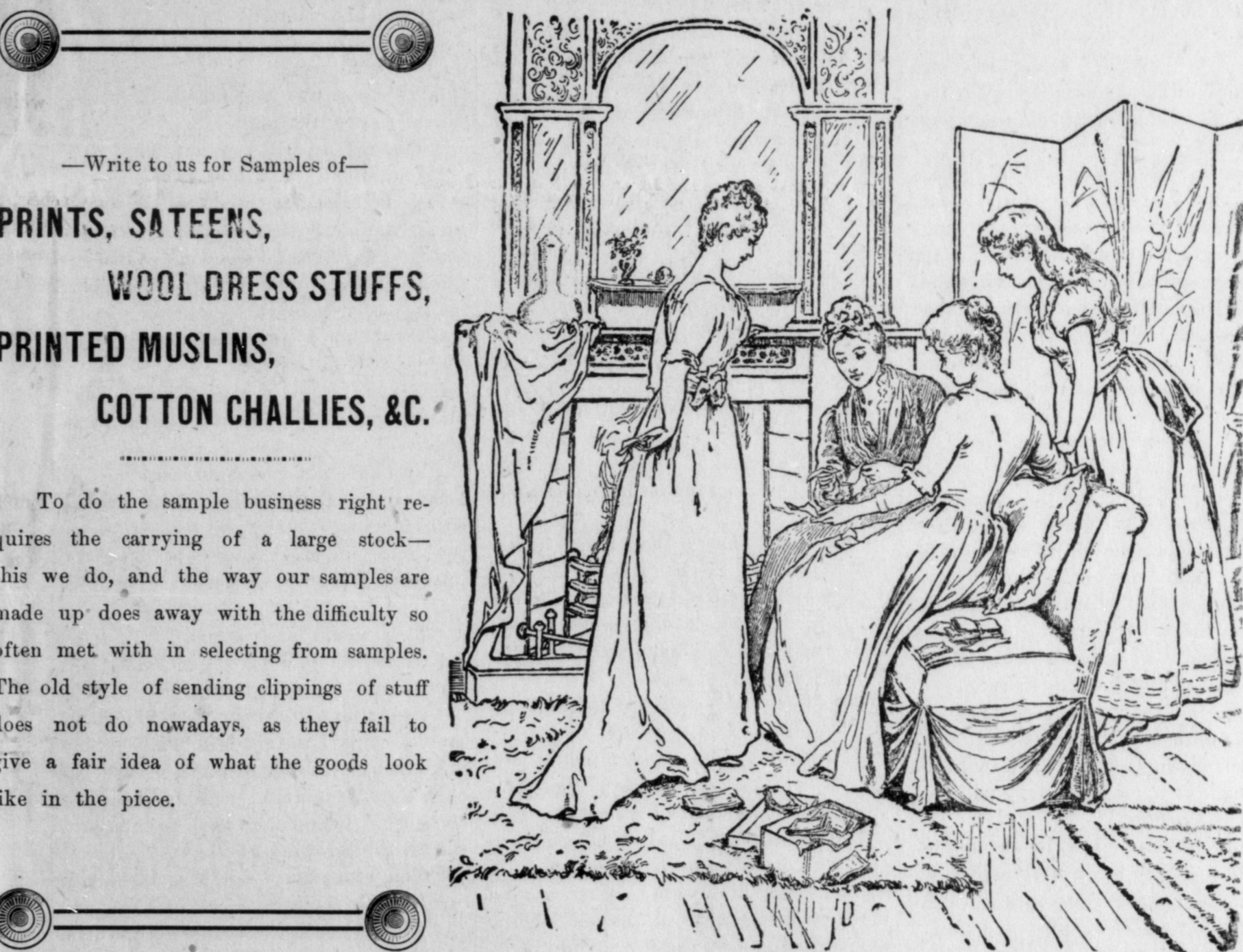
