Illegal Use of his Name.

NEW YORK, June 19.—Sir Morrell Mackenzie, the distinguished British physician, has, through Simon Sterne of this city, his counsel, brought suit for ten thousand dollars damages against the Soden Mineral Spring Company and the Eisner Mendelson Company, of No. 6 Barclay street, for the unauthorized use of his name in connection with a proprietary medicine manufactured by them. In his complaint Sir Morrell sets forth that such use of his name by defendants on their wrappers, circulars and advertisements is ir jurious to his professional standing, and offensive to his feelings. It is, he says, a part of the written and m written code of medical ethics thoughout the civinzed world that a professional physician should have no interest in any proprietary medicine or surgical instrument, and that he shall not recommend patent medicines for indiscriminate use by the public, because no remedy can be safely recommended without knowledge of the special conditions and circumstances of the patient, and the publication of such indiscriminate recommendation casts upon the physician the suspicion that he has a personal pecuniary interest in the medicine to the great and irremediable loss of his prestige and professional standing.
