#### Doctor of Philosophy.

At an audience given by His Holiness  
the Pope on the 17th of May last, to Car-  
dinal Jacobini, Archbishop of Tyre, and  
secretary of the Sacred Congregation of  
the Propaganda, Mr. Richard F. Quigley,  
LL. B., barrister, of St. John, was created  
a Doctor of Philosophy. On Sunday 21st  
inst., the feast of St. Aloysius, he made  
his profession of faith before His Lord-  
ship Bishop Sweeney.

The Papal decree, which is under the  
seal of Cardinal Jacobini, sets forth that  
Richard F. Quigley having highly approv-  
ed himself to the Sacred Congregation of  
the Propaganda of the Faith, by constant  
testimony of piety and integrity of morals,  
as well as zeal in promoting the good of  
religion, and since over and above these  
things he has made it apparent that he is  
to be very highly commended for philoso-  
phical learning, and account being taken,  
too, of the most honorable testimony given  
on his behalf by His Lordship Bishop  
Rogers, the Holy Father, wishing to heap  
upon him special favor, by apostolic au-  
thority has benignly created and declared  
him a Doctor of Philosophy, with all the  
rights, honors and obligations annexed  
thereto, and which are proper to philoso-  
phy.

The honor conferred upon Dr. Quigley  
is the highest that can be given a layman  
by the Pope, and has been conferred upon  
very few persons in the English speaking  
world. Dr. Quigley is the first layman in  
America to receive the degree, which was  
granted for merit as well as honor.

Dr. Quigley made his philosophical stud-  
ies at St. Michael's College, Chatham,  
and the application to Rome for the de-  
gree was initiated and came appropriately  
from Rev. Wm. Varrily, P. P., Bathurst  
village (who was one of the Professors),  
and was endorsed by Bishop Rogers, in  
whose diocese the college was situated.  
The application was forwarded, through  
the Archbishop of Halifax, on the 17th of  
April, and on the 17th of May the Secre-  
tary of Propaganda, after consideration of  
the facts set before him and an examina-  
tion of Dr. Quigley's work, "Ipsa, Ipsa,  
Ipsum," was able to obtain the decree from  
His Holiness.—Globe.

#### Illegal Use of his Name.

New York, June 19.—Sir Morrell  
Mackenzie, the distinguished British phy-  
sician, has, through Simon Sterne of this  
city, his counsel, brought suit for ten  
thousand dollars damages against the  
Soden Mineral Spring Company and the  
Eisner Mendelson Company, of No. 6  
Barclay street, for the unauthorized use of  
his name in connection with a proprietary  
medicine manufactured by them. In his  
complaint Sir Morrell sets forth that such  
use of his name by defendants on their  
wrappers, circulars and advertisements is  
injurious to his professional standing, and  
offensive to his feelings. It is, he says, a  
part of the written and unwritten code of  
medical ethics throughout the civilized  
world that a professional physician should  
have no interest in any proprietary medi-  
cine or surgical instrument, and that he  
shall not recommend patent medicines for  
indiscriminate use by the public, because  
no remedy can be safely recommended  
without knowledge of the special condi-  
tions and circumstances of the patient,  
and the publication of such indiscriminate  
recommendation casts upon the physician  
the suspicion that he has a personal pecu-  
niary interest in the medicine to the great  
and irremediable loss of his prestige and  
professional standing.

#### Big Head in the Morning.

A paper truthfully remarks: Most  
people will admit that holidays have their  
uses, if they are not abused, but most  
people will also admit that they are glad  
when the holidays are over. After all the  
happiest and most satisfactory condition  
to be in, is that of being actually employ-  
ed in some useful and legitimate business.

The Emperor of Japan has decreed that  
hereafter every challenge to a duel or ac-  
ceptance of a challenge is to be punished  
by imprisonment of from six months to  
two years.

As illustrations of the German Emper-  
or's hand in petty political prosecutions,  
a club at Erfurt has been indicted for at-  
tending an atheistic lecture "to the scandal  
of all true believers." Also, a priest has  
been indicted for advising the friends of  
a sick man to remove some imperial por-  
traits from his room. The defendant  
pleaded that he considered the dresses  
worn by the Empress Frederick and her  
daughter-in-law unduly décolleté, and  
made an elaborate speech on the subject.

The Justices of the Supreme Court and  
of the Court of Appeals in New York  
have put on black silk robes, in which  
they appear with much dignity and plea-  
sure. The public crowd to see them in  
their new habiliments, and evidently ap-  
prove of the new departure.

California reports a grasshopper plague.  
The San Francisco Bulletin says: "The  
grasshopper pest is in sections for over  
eight miles north and south in Calaveras  
county. They have destroyed fruit, corn,  
beans, melons and gardens, wherever they  
are or have been; also the olive and  
fruit trees. Saturday they reached Milton,  
and there is not a bush or flower left in  
the cemetery, and they are travelling  
northwest through the town, sweeping  
every green thing before them as they  
go."

Judge Peters of the supreme court of  
P. E. Island, died on Saturday after a  
protracted illness. He was born at Mira-  
michi and went to P. E. Island in 1838.  
ten years later he was elevated to the  
bench. He married a daughter of the  
late Sir Samuel Cunard, and leaves three  
sons, one the premier of the province, and  
two daughters.

Mrs. Packson, the newly elected mayor  
of Kiowa, Kan., gave notice to the eight  
or ten "joins" of the town, which were  
kept open contrary to law, that they must  
close. A deputation, including it is said,  
the husband of the mayor, waited upon  
her to connive at the continuance of the  
saloons. Mrs. Packson answered that her  
oath of office required her to carry out the  
provisions of the law, and that she had not  
yet been in politics long enough to learn  
how to break her word and still be respect-  
able. The saloons were closed.
