Innocent.

The hot ashes of an old tragedy were
stirred the other day in New York when
in a paper read to a great meeting of the
Catholic Historical Society, New York,
Father Walter, of St. Patrick's Church,
Washington, solemnly vindicated Mrs.
Sturatt from all participation in the
murder of Abraham Lincoln, for which
she was hanged.

"When she was arrested," he says, "she
sent for me and I attended her spiritual
wants until she went to the scaffold. I
cannot, of course, violate my vows to the
Church and tell secrets of the Confession-
al, but I will say from what I know Mrs.
Sturatt was innocent of any complicity
in that great crime. Even on the morn-

ing of the woman's execution I attempt-
ed to obtain a reprieve for her, but I was
unsuccessful, and she died, I believe, a
innocent of that crime as a baby unborn."

Cases like this furnish the strongest
argument against capital punishment.
Human justice itself should never put it
out of its own power to rectify the errors
to which it is so liable. But, surely
Father Walter's declaration should at
least have justice done to that unhappy
lady's memory, who died a victim to ju-
dicial blundering and public excitement.
