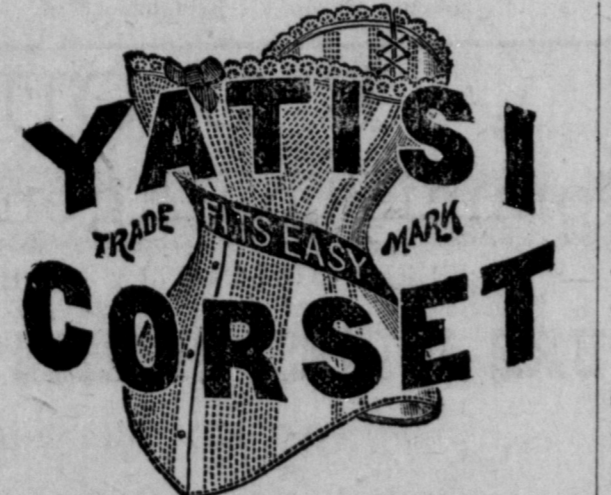
The Portuguese in Africa have fired upon the British steamer "Agnes," conveying the Willoughby expedition and seized the cargo and boats.
