Baptized in Her Coffin.
Mrs. George Lyre, who has been an invalid for some time from consumption, died, at all appearance a short time since. As life appeared to be entirely extinct the body was laid out on a bed and the undertaker summoned. While several of the woman's relatives were standing at the bedside, suddenly the supposed corpse rose up and in a hollow voice said: "I must be baptized instantly."

The shock to all present was horrible. The undertaker was sent away, and the woman's minister, the Rev. W. W. Gross summoned. When he arrived the woman told him she had been born again and had to be baptized. She wanted to go to church, but the pastor refused to take her, saying it would kill her. She however insisted that she must be baptized some way or other, and suggested that they fill the metallic coffin with water and baptize her in that. This immediately was carried out. The coffin was filled with warm water and she was lifted into it. At the touch of the water she was revived, as if from an electric shock. She shouted "Glory," several times, with a smile on her face, as the rite of baptism was administered. She is much stronger, and will recover. Her voice is strong and natural, and her recovery is looked upon as miraculous.—Cleveland Leader.
