The ground lies untilled before them, the earth smiles in vain while they are lolling in their hammocks, smoking and gaming throughout the day, the very pattern of laziness and indolence. The evenings are passed in serenading to the notes of a guitar very badly handled, or singing and revelling at some fandango.

The island is supplied with flour and other provisions from Brazil, but supplies are sometimes very deficient.

The cattle of the island are very fine, and good supply of fresh beef may be obtained, but not at all times. Permission must be obtained from the governer before any person can land. There is a force of about 100 men stationed on the island under the command of a major, who is also the governor, and the judge of all offences committed on the island. The free population amounts to about 200 inhabitants. The governor was exceedingly attentive and kind, and gave us a fine lot of water meions as well as fresh new milk.

Seven forts were erected on the island by the Portuguese when they were in their wealth and power.
