

From Noronha.

To the Editor of The Review:

DEAR SIR:—Perhaps it may interest the readers of your paper to read a few words about this beautiful island in the South Atlantic, a few degrees south of the equator. We had the pleasure of calling there on our passage to Santors, on account of being short of water, it was an uncalled for pleasure, yet could not be avoided.

Fernando Noronha is about four and three-quarter miles in length from E. N. E. to W. S. W., and about 1 1/2 miles in breadth, and is irregular in shape, its southern shore appeared to be very much indented, its position is in lat. 3 degrees, 50 minutes and 40 seconds south, and in long. 32 degrees, 35 minutes and 30 seconds west. It is evidently volcanic, and the Pyramid, its chief natural curiosity, bears traces of such origin, this is a high rugged peak on its northern shore, estimated to rise to the height of about 1000 feet, which is so peculiar in form that at a distance it is not unlike a church steeple. The island is used by the Brazilians as a place of transportation for criminals as well as for the exile of political dependents. It has been successively under the dominion of Portugal, Holland, France and Brazil. The scenery of the island is enchanting, the shore is scooped out by divers inlets and embossed with green promontories, which are connected by circling beaches, where rippling waves chase each other over the silvery sands and lathe the flowerets of the skirting woods. A richness and variety of vegetation is seen every where except on the Pyramid of naked rock, which, rising from the bosom of a grove stands erect in barren ruggedness towering majestically over the smiling and fruitful scenes around. When traversing the woody dale it can be seen through the breaks and over the trees presenting a monument of grandeur and sublimity on which the eye might rest for hours. The scenery is all fertility and beauty. The vegetation is perpetual and vigorous, at the close of day it is most interesting to watch the plants folding up their leaves and drooping their heads, as if wearied by the fervent heat of the sun. I have read of the sleep of plants, but I do not recollect of having noticed it so distinctly before, the change in the aspect of the leaves is very remarkable.

The small village in Peak Bay is built in the form of a square and on the north side of the island, the houses are poorly built, but are sufficient for the place. Most have gardens attached to them, and the governor has a farm to a short distance from the village from whence his table is supplied, the employment of the people consists principally of fishing, for which purpose they manufacture a cotton line. Agriculture is much neglected, the greater part of the island being as nature left it, but the soil is very rich and would pay the people well to cultivate it.

The cotton hand net is used for seining and with it they haul a great many fish, while the operation of drawing the seine is going forward on the beach, some are occupied in angling from the rocks of the projecting points, and among them sufficient fish are caught for the provision of all the islanders. Groups of naked fellows may be seen seated on the beach watching the operation of the fishermen, while the pelican is continually diving about the surf with the man-of-war bird over him, who, as the pelican rises with his prey, darts down upon him with incredible rapidity and makes him instantly disgorge it, when it is readily seized by this second plunderer. The attempt of those islanders at navigation are confined to catamarans, not a single boat being found in the whole island, all ideas of improving on anything are foreign to their minds. The ground lies untillied before them, the earth smiles in vain while they are lolling in their hammocks, smoking and gaming throughout the day, the very pattern of laziness and indolence. The evenings are passed in serenading to the notes of a guitar very badly handled, or singing and revelling at some fandango.

The island is supplied with flour and other provisions from Brazil, but supplies are sometimes very deficient. The cattle of the island are very fine, and good supply of fresh beef may be obtained, but not at all times. Permission must be obtained from the governor before any person can land. There is a force of about 100 men stationed on the island under the command of a major, who is also the governor, and the judge of all offences committed on the island. The free population amounts to about 200 inhabitants. The governor was exceedingly attentive and kind, and gave us a fine lot of water melons as well as fresh new milk. Seven forts were erected on the island by the Portuguese when they were in their wealth and power.

The mother, alarmed at the detonations, rushed into the bedroom and found both of her children weltering in their blood upon the floor. Uttering a piercing scream, she fell upon their bodies and fainted. The entire house was aroused and the ex-Mayor sent for. Roy is hardly expected to live. The mother is in a precarious condition.


