Killed by Lightning.

Miss Keefe, daughter of John Keefe, of Skinner's Pond, P. E. I., was killed by lightning last Sunday night. She was engaged to be married in a very short time, and was spending the evening in the front room with her lover, when she was struck dead by the fatal fluid. Her lover was struck senseless and had a marvellously narrow escape from death. All the other inmates were made insensible by the stroke and the house was wrecked. Miss Keefe was a fine girl, 25 years of age.

Drowning Accident at Chatham.

At 9 o'clock Friday night, as the Italian barque Simpatia was coming into port, in tow of the St. Andrew, the ship chandler's man rowed out to her. Mr. Watt's men got a line and were handing up his card when they heard a great commotion on deck, the sailors all running to the other side, and were wondering what it meant when Pilot John Martin came to the side and told them Mr. Muirhead's boat had upset and her crew were in the water. They cast off and rowed around, and the steamer stopped. They heard a shout and rowed for it, and found Thomas Anderson swimming for the Chatham side of the river. They pulled him in but neither saw nor heard anything of his two companions, Alexander and Thomas McFarlane, father and son. The boat had been caught near the bow of the ship, by a ragged edge of copper, as they failed to catch on in the darkness, and the gunwale was drawn under. Thomas McFarlane jumped out, and the others stayed in her till she filled. Alex. McFarlane clung to Anderson's back, though he was a good swimmer, till they went down, and then let go. Anderson came up and swam around till he was picked up. Men are grappling for the bodies to-day.—World.

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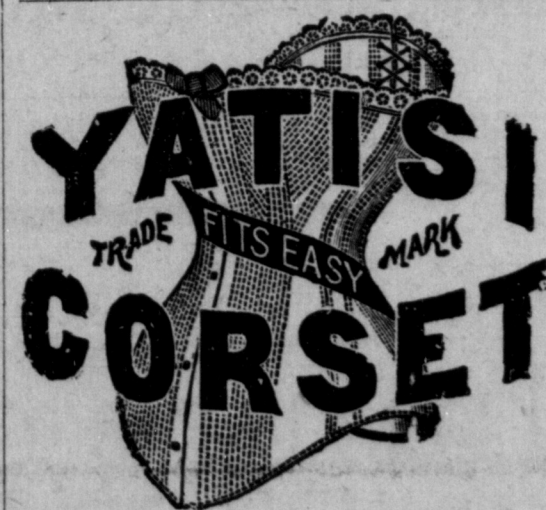
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
