Josie, Portland, Me.—Our reason for not publishing notes is meaning so vague very few would understand although those who did would no doubt enjoy them very much.

A Denver, Colorado, despatch of July 24 relates a Blue Mountain tragedy. It was at a ball. One Roach, a tough character, insisted upon dancing. He was told all the sets were full, but as he was intoxicated he did not heed this. He stabbed Farnk Hyde, and when a cowboy attempted to reason with him he shot him. No one was armed and the people were horror stricken. A boy slipped to a neighboring house and got a Winchester. The lad fired at Roach and killed Mrs. Walton, "an estimable lady living in the community." Terror then reigned supreme, but Roach slipped away. All this occurred in the local school house.

Mira Fancher, a beautiful girl only sixteen years old, shot and instantly killed A. C. Jones, section foreman on the Florida Central and Peninsular railroad, near Jacksonville, Fla. She lay in wait for him at a street corner, and when he approached she blew out his brains with a 32-calibre revolver. Jones had ruined her and married another woman.

John Hannah, an old man who lived near Beaver Lake, nine miles from St. John, met with a horrible death Friday night. He had gone to look for cattle, and the wife of the missing man fearing that he had had some trouble with a ferocious bull that they owned, a searching party was about to start to look for him. A neighbor drove about a mile and saw lying in a field about a hundred yards from the road a body which he recognized as Hannah. He feared to go near as the bull was lying close beside it, but he could notice blood stains on the clothes. The unfortunate man had been gored to death and had been lying in the same spot all night. The animal was shot.

Another horror has been added to the late list of railroad accidents in Ohio. Friday morning passenger train No. 4, on the Bellair, Seanesville & Cincinnati narrow-gauge railroad, left the track three miles south of Bellair, two cars being overturned and dragged some distance by the engine. There were seventy passengers on the train, and the two cars that turned over into the ditch were crowded with well-known people of that section. When they left the track someone cried out that everybody should cling to their seats, but the shock was so awful many were hurled from one side to the other, though not badly injured, being terribly shaken up. When all were finally taken out of the wreck it was found that fourteen people had been injured, four of them seriously and one fatally.
