GENTLEMEN:—It has been said that

And, following upon the lines of that wise  
conclusion, I observe that some men are  
born politicians, hearing greatness, while  
others are appointed justices of the peace,  
thereby having greatness thrust upon them.  
All men cannot be justices of the peace,  
or there would be no preference, conse-  
quently no greatness. Neither can all  
men be political leaders or great legislators,  
or the grand and equitable principles of  
responsible government would not become  
mysterious and complicated, and to the  
ordinary mind as incomprehensible as  
modern orthodoxy or metaphysics.

Gentlemen electors, in pursuance of the  
fact that a large and numerous signed  
petition could be presented to me,  
asking me to offer myself as a candidate  
in the coming political contest, I take this  
early opportunity to announce to you  
that Barkis is will i'.

Being fully sensible of the weighty  
responsibility I would be taking on myself  
in going to Fredericton as your political  
scapegoat, representing all your claims and  
grievances, and thereby placing myself in  
a position to be in constant jeopardy of  
sacrificing my prospects for eternal happi-  
ness. Notwithstanding gentlemen, Barkis is  
willin', and I before accepting of your votes,  
which will elect me with a very large ma-  
jority if you all vote for me, I judge it  
to be my duty and very great privilege to  
define my political prejudices and party  
principles.

Gentlemen, considering the many and  
varied politics of this county, I have con-  
cluded to follow the example left us by  
Paul, the great Apostle, and be all things  
to all men. And right here I want to take  
every voter into my confidence bosom,  
and, as I do not wish to gain votes by any  
underhand promises to any favored few,  
I want every voter to know that if any  
office becomes vacant he is the man who  
will get it.

Gentlemen, there being an organized  
government in charge of the affairs of this  
province, you will doubtless want to know  
whether I shall support such government.  
Having no desire to stand on both sides of  
the political line, I should say the acts and  
doings of the present government should  
merit the approbation or condemnation  
of all men having the most extreme views  
for or against the government.

Gentlemen, the agricultural interest of  
this county is one of the most important,  
and I desire to bring to your notice the  
wisdom of the government in abolishing  
the Provincial farm, inasmuch as it afforded  
convenient evidence for reference for all  
parties contending that farming is not a  
profitable business in this county, gentle-  
men, I have yet to see a farm that will not  
produce a mortgage, if the owner is suffi-  
ciently skilled in indolence and laziness.

On the other hand, gentlemen, I submit  
there has been a very great want of wis-  
dom in the past legislation effecting the  
agricultural interest of this county. This  
true the government has made considerable  
effort to introduce a better grade of  
horses, spending a large sum of money for  
that purpose, and some of the government  
staff did risk their lives crossing the  
ocean to make a selection of the breeds.  
But, gentlemen, have you considered how  
little interest the government has mani-  
fested in the introduction of a better class  
of potato bugs, year after year people are  
compelled to raise the cold-blooded, hun-  
gry and vicious kind now in the country,  
a big, unprofitable kind, a class of bugs  
that, figuratively speaking, are eating their  
heads off ten times every season. Gentle-  
men, as your representative I shall endeavor  
to so arouse Mr. Blair as to cause him  
to appoint every man who improves the  
breed of potato bugs to the proud position  
of a Justice of the Peace, and cause him to  
command that the coarse breed now in  
use shall be entirely annihilated forthwith.

Another very important matter, one of  
vital interest—yes, a matter that involves  
a large amount of principle, as well as  
interest, is our educational system. Gentle-  
men, I have concluded that our educa-  
tional system is using up the brains of our  
country about as fast as could reasonably  
be expected. Mr. Crockett, while he was  
chief superintendent, failed to keep in  
mind that part of scripture commanding  
servants to obey their masters, and, as a  
consequence, he was discharged from the  
position. For that, gentlemen, I do not  
blame Mr. Blair. I have no doubt the  
regulations under the new superintendent  
will be fully as methodical, if not more  
so, as heretofore. But, gentlemen, I would  
ask you to consider that while Mr. Blair  
goes down into Westmorland, a large, rich

accept of one inch of Methodist faith, he  
sends down to this poor county and de-  
mands over six feet of Roman Catholicism.  
Whether he thinks one inch of Methodist  
faith equal to six feet of Roman Catho-  
lic faith, or whether he thinks it will  
take six feet of Romanism to counteract  
the guile of one inch of Methodism, or  
whether it will take both to fill the void  
made where Mr. Crockett lifted out his  
Presbyterianism, I cannot, just at present,  
say, but, I can assure you, as soon as I get  
to Fredericton I shall find out, and let  
you know.

Gentlemen, Mr. Blair wants you to support  
big Angus, a man who will weigh at  
least two hundred and fifty on his sock  
feet, and, if you should put on him the  
weight of attending the position he is  
seeking, you will find him a fearful load  
to support.

Gentlemen, I would like to ask you to  
consider how much easier you could support  
a light little fellow like me, in fact,  
if you give me your votes I will under-  
take to almost support myself.

Having been informed that Mr. Moses  
Barriean is also a candidate for your suf-  
frages, I would just say, in reference to  
the fact, it is appointed unto all men to  
pay taxes while they live, and once to

**Attended His Own Inquest.**

Dennis Mulcahy, a packing-house em-

rubbed his eyes, glanced again, muttered  
to himself, grabbed his hat and fled. He  
returned soon afterward with a live man—  
A living picture of the deceased. "This  
is Mulcahy; that there ain't," he anno-  
unced triumphantly. Then he explained  
that he had been mistaken, and Mulcahy  
said he was glad of it, and then the two  
went out and had a drink to the health of  
the deceased. The jury continued the  
inquest, not as to what caused the demise,  
but as to the identity of the dead man.  
Nothing was learned, however, as there  
was nothing at hand bearing on either  
point. It is supposed that the unfortun-  
ate crawled into the car to sleep and passed  
away with heart disease. The man was  
about thirty-five years of age, and was in  
the garb of a laborer.

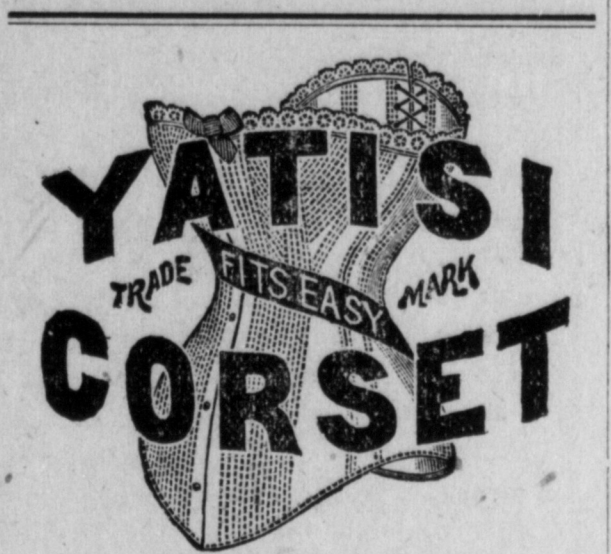

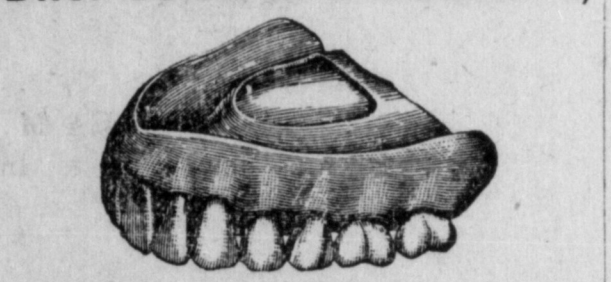

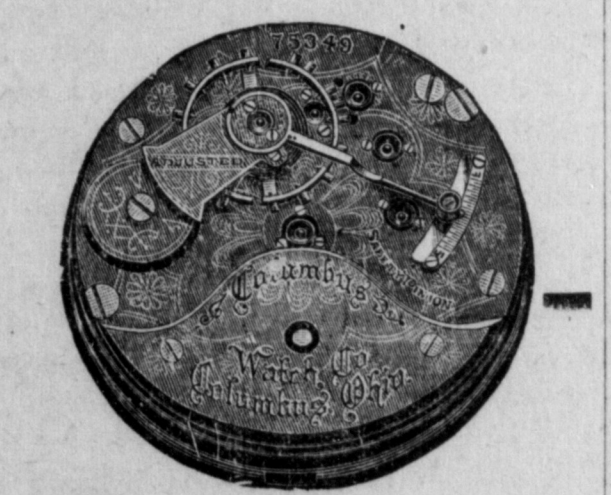
