THE SCARE ALONG THE UNITED STATES SEA COAST.

People living in sea board cities in the United States are in a rather scared condition. They dread a visit from some of those tremendous Italian iron-clad ships of war, of which so much has been said of late years. The Italian Government deeply resents the massacre of some eleven Italians by a New Orleans mob. Some of the slaughtered men were at the moment of their murder subjects of the King of Italy. The United States Government was bound by treaty to protect their lives and property in the United States. On learning of the massacre, the Italian Government demanded from that of the United States that the murderers should be brought to trial, and that the families of the slaughtered men should be indemnified. Indemnification was promised, but the Federal Government declared itself powerless to ensure the trial and punishment of the lynchers. Thereupon, the Italian Minister was withdrawn from Washington. Usually after such a withdrawal the next step is a declaration of war. For a time such a declaration was feared, and a calculation of immediate possible results was made. Of course the invasion of neither country by an army is looked for. The war, if it occurs, will be a naval one. Now, the Italian navy is perhaps ten times more powerful than that of the United States. Even when compared with those of England and France, the Italian navy is a highly respectable one. Some of its line of battle ships are among the most powerful ships afloat. One of them well handled in plenty sea room would be more than a match for the whole United States fleet. In this state of things it is felt to be possible that every deep water harbor along the Atlantic coast of the United States may be brought within range of Italian guns, and every city lying around such harbors may be at the mercy of Italian ships.

The probabilities are against the likelihood of war, but the scare on the question is unmistakable. On the merits of the question, the judgment of the civilized world seems to be against the lynchers. Some of the men lynched were probably highly criminal. Some of them were probably entirely innocent of the crimes of which they were suspected. Some of them were acquitted by a jury in an open trial. The plea of justification is that the jury acquitting was bribed. The charge is not proved. Besides it is no new thing in the United States, and, indeed, many other countries, for men tried on a murder charge to be acquitted. Unfortunately, too, lynching is no new device in the United States. First and last, probably hundreds of poor wretches have been done to death in that country by lynching, many of whom were, doubtless, guiltless of any crime meriting death.

This difficulty with Italy has brought to the front a grievous defect in the constitution of the United States, which sooner or later will have to be amended. Under that constitution, as it stands, the Federal Government disavows responsibility for acts of outrage committed in the respective states on the persons or property of foreign subjects, on the plea that such acts come under the purview alone of the several State authorities. Clearly either the Federal Government should be made responsible, or the State responsible should be held liable to war measures against it on refusal to render justice.

THE LEBLANC CASE

At the moment of writing the LeBlanc case has not been settled. But a few points relating thereto have been established. It is placed beyond doubt that Mr. LeBlanc intended to resign his seat in the Assembly prior to becoming a candidate for election to the House of Commons; also, that he believed he had resigned. So far as Mr. LeBlanc is concerned that should settle the whole matter. If by any legal dodge or quibble it should be made to appear that the legality of his resignation is doubtful, he should seem to take advantage of it. He should repeat the performance with all due formality, and at the time withdraw from public life. It will redound to his credit to take such a stand.

The pretence on which it is said that the resignation was null seems to be a shallow one. It is contended that the Federal election held in Kent a few weeks ago was illegal because of a few errors made by officials concerned. Let the contention be true or false, the resignation seems to have been real and made in good faith.

THE FELLOWS FARCE.

An attempt was made last week before a committee of the Legislative Council to ascertain whether or no Mr. Fellows, lately appointed to a seat in that body, was or was not a resident of this Province. That would seem a matter easy to determine. But the result was a failure. The petitioner adverse to Mr. Fellows had no witnesses at hand, Mr. Fellows refused to be sworn and to testify in the case, also refused sworn or not sworn to be cross-examined by a lawyer in the matter, and the committee refused to summon witnesses required by the counsel for the petitioner. The proceedings as reported were simply farcical. It is time for the Council to perform on itself the happy despatch. New Brunswick people would be glad to see it disappear from the stage of action.

THE PROPOSED GERRYMANDER.

The local government again proposes to gerrymander the constituency of St. John city and county, so that hereafter the city may elect four representatives and the county parishes two. There seems to be no pressing necessity for such a measure, though some change in the electoral districts might be made to the general advantage. But the St. John constituencies should be meddled with only in a general measure, applicable to the whole Province, based on justice, rectifying all anomalies and equalizing representation. Of course the government hopes to increase its strength in the Assembly by the operation of the gerrymander proposed.

Sligo has followed Kilkenny in its election of anti-Parnellite candidate. The indications are that the Parnell influence will go to the wall in the next general election. The Catholic clergy high and low seem to be a unit against the fallen leader, and to be determined to effect his utter overthrow. They will probably succeed. How the home rule movement will be affected thereby, time alone can fully show.

LeBlanc Retires.

FREDERICTON, March 7.
 Mr. LeBlanc to-day announced his intention of resigning. The feeling of opposition to his taking the seat had grown in intensity during the last few days to such a degree that the government found that if they persisted in the re-seating of Mr. LeBlanc, it would unseat them. Carlyle's evidence completely destroyed Sayre's contention as to the illegality of the election, and LeBlanc's evidence showed that he was acting under constraint, and not on his own judgment. The government has received a severe blow. Many supporters expressed the disgust they feel.

Italy has severed diplomatic relations with the United States by recalling Baron Fava, its minister at Washington, because the United States government has not given assurances that the murderers of Italian subjects, acquitted by American magistrates and murdered in prison while under the immediate protection of the authorities of New Orleans would be brought to justice.
