A Blasphemer Stricken Dumb.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 9.—The French Catholics of this city are in a state of excitement over what they call a miracle. A former member of the church while indulging in the most terrible blasphemy was stricken with paralysis a few days ago and is now unable to speak. The man's name is Louis Le May. A number of friends had called on him to persuade him to attend church, when he began to denounce church, religion and priests. The next minute Le May, it is said, was seen to grow rigid. His arms drew up convulsively and he gasped for breath. He endeavored to speak, but could not utter a word. The persons who witnessed the sudden and fearful stroke at once pronounced it a visitation of Providence. They were completely awed by the man's condition. A physician was summoned and Le May was taken to his home in a helpless condition.

An Unnatural Mother's Act.

BERLIN, March 11.—An account comes from the village of Quenstedt, near Kalle, of an unheard of outrage which has been going on for the last six years. A man, 32 years of age, the son of a rich widow named Dorn, who was supposed by his neighbors to have emigrated to America, has been found by the police in the cellar of his mother's homestead, where he has been kept for six years. On being brought to light of day he was found to be blind and speechless and to have lost the use of both legs. He was naked, his only covering being a coarse and dirty horse blanket. The mother has admitted having kept her son imprisoned during this long period because her husband by his will left him a larger slice of his property than to her favorite son, his younger brother.
