Shook the Melonaeon.

The great excitement attending the
election in Canada extended far enough
across the border to include the former
residents of the Dominion in Boston and
vicinity, and they were almost as intensely
interested in the outcome as Macdonald
and Laurier's immediate followers.

A great many of them went down to
their native places the first of the week,
either to take a personal hand in the fray,
or to watch the exciting contest from close
range, but a large proportion of the 50,000
who remained right around the Hub, found
their way to the Melonaeon last evening,
where arrangements had been made for the
bulletining of special despatches announc-
ing the result of the election in the various
provinces and counties. The hall was
filled, the great majority of the men and
women present being from the maritime
provinces, most of them from Nova Scotia
and New Brunswick.

The election returns from the various
Canadian centres were bulletined as fast as
they were received the news of a promi-
nent candidate's election or defeat was hail-
ed with vociferous applause or hisses, ac-
cording as it met the views of those pre-
sent. The meeting was about evenly
divided between Conservative and Liberal
sympathizers and they simply "made
Rome howl." A more enthusiastic and
excited gathering never assembled under
the roof of Tremont Temple, in all its
history of political rallies.

Portraits of Sir John Macdonald, Hon.
Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Charles Tupper, Hon.
Richard Cartwright and others were inter-
spersed, and were greeted with wild cheers
and applause. As the result in each
county of the maritime provinces was an-
nounced, views of local scenery and por-
traits of its leading men were displayed on
the screen.

The humorous sentiments of the audi-
ence were appealed to by a number of
facetious bulletins, such as "Dear Mr.
McKinley, please let us have free potatoes."
"Johnny" has evidently got his gun."
"St. John, N. B., is lost in the fog," etc.
A number of funny cartoons, applicable
to defeated or elected candidates, were
also shown.

The prospects vibrated so rapidly from
Conservative to Liberal, and vice versa,
that the audience became worked up to a
high degree of excitement, but at 10 o'clock
the complete result seemed still so far off
that the closing bulletin, "May the Best
Side Win," was displayed and the audience
dispersed.—Boston Globe, 6th.

The Latest Returns.

The latest returns from the several pro-
vinces show that it is very probable that
Sir John Macdonald will have a majority
from every province except Prince Edward
Island on a party division. The elections
in Algoma, Ontario, Huntington, Quebec,
and Cariboo, British Columbia are yet to
be held. Tarte, who was elected as an in-
dependent candidate in Montmorency,
will support the government on its general
policy. Taking no account of elections
yet to be held, although government can-
didates are likely to be returned for two
if not for all three seats, it appears the
returns by provinces are about as follows:

The above shows a government majority
of at least 36, with three constituencies
yet to hear from. Probably, when all the
returns are in, the government will have a

majority of 39 or 40 votes on a party divi-
sion. The victory was in every sense a
most splendid one in view of the desperate
efforts that were made to overthrow the
government.—Herald.

The New Orleans Lynching.

Boston Sunday papers give full details
of the massacre in the New Orleans city
prison of the Italians charged with the
murder of Chief of Police Hennessey.
The excited public charged that the cor-
oner's jury was bribed. Led by A. M.
Parkinson with rifles and pistols they broke
into the jail, and riddled some of the un-
fortunate men with bullets. The people
outside, maddened by hearing what was
going on inside and not seeing any of it,
demanded that some of the victims be
brought out to them. It was, therefore,
decided to hang Polizzi and Bagnetto.
The street for squares around was filled
with people, among whom were a large
number of women and children. At 11
o'clock the side door on Marais street was
pushed open, and several of the armed men
appeared, pushing before them Polizzi,
the half-crazed Sicilian, who offered to turn
state's evidence, but who went crazy while
doing so. He was ghastly white with
terror, and was evidently mad. He was
without coat or hat, wore a red flannel
shirt, and his black hair was dishevelled.
The crowd was so dense there that it was
difficult to force a way through it. Some
portion of the audience were women, and
from the balconies near men and women
watched the scene with opera glasses. At
the corner was a gaunt lamp post. Some-
one threw a rope across the heads of the
cool and collected men who were pushing
the prisoner along, and when the corner
was reached a man scaled the post and
threw the rope around it. The ready
hands at the other end tugged at the line
and the body was hoisted in the air, the
face, white as chalk, being turned upward
to the bright sky above, but the rope did
not hold at first and the body slipped down
to the pavement again.

Only for an instant, however, did it re-
main there. In a couple of seconds
stronger hands drew it taut again, and
soon the body of the unfortunate assassin
was dangling from the post.

Polizzi was still quivering when the cry
went up that they were lynching another
man on the other side of the prison in
front of Orleans street, whereupon the en-
tire mob surged in that direction.

It was found that the man who was be-
ing brought out was Antonio Bagnetto,
one of those acquitted yesterday. Some-
one ascended a tree in the Orleans park
and threw a rope around a convenient
limb, when Bagnetto was swung up.

The mob wanted the others out to
lynch, but they were told that enough had
been done, and there would be no more
done.

The whole proceeding occupied barely
45 minutes.
