FREDERICTON, March 13.
Mr. Burchill gave notice of a motion for copy of the contract between the government and John O'Brien for a bridge across the Southwest Miramichi, and for the correspondence in regard to extras for that work.

Mr. Mitchell submitted the school report with a variety of other returns, including that of county indebtedness.

Mr. McQueen, from the committee to present to his honor the address in answer to his speech, submitted his honor's reply.
Mr. Blair, from the committee to nominate all standing committees, reported as follows:—

FREDERICTON, March 14.

Mr. Turner gave notice of a motion praying that His Honor the Lieutenant Governor will cause to be laid before the House a detailed statement, with items and dates of all liabilities of any kind for which the department of public works, the Chief Commissioner, or any other officer thereof, as such, in any way liable or responsible, whether due or not yet due, on any contract or other agreement, including every liability of any nature or kind for any public work or service yet unpaid, to whom and for what work or service the liability was incurred; also a full statement in detail of all extras claimed by any person whatsoever for or on account of any public work or service or contract or agreement for any such work or service, giving the names, dates, items and other particulars of any account or claim rendered, or made for such, or for any extras; also a statement in detail of all the bridges which have simultaneously fallen into decay and which the executive or department of public works feel unable to provide funds to renew or repair from the current revenues referred to in the speech of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor on the opening of the present session; also a statement of the estimated amount required for renewal and repairs of said bridges.

Mr. Mitchell submitted estimates of sums required for the service of the province not otherwise provided for.

Supply was made the order of the day for Wednesday.

Mr. Hanington complained that the government were hurrying on supply in the absence of the auditor general's and other important reports.

Mr. Blair replied that the government were proceeding in the same manner as they had for years, as the old government had done and as they do at Ottawa. The resolutions leading up to the fixing of the day for considering supply are always made on the same day, the estimates are submitted. The auditor general's reports were all ready and would be immediately submitted to the House. The House would not be asked to consider supply until all necessary reports were before them.

Mr. Hanington then said the resolution moved by the Provincial Secretary should come second and not first in order in the series of resolutions leading up to the fixing of the date of supply.

Mr. Speaker agreed with this view.

Mr. Mitchell had no objection to change the order in which he would move the resolution, which he proceeded to do, and supply was made the order of the day for 2.30 p. m. on Wednesday.

Mr. Hanington gave notice of a motion for Tuesday next: Resolved, That a humble address be presented to His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Honor will be pleased to cause to be laid before this House a statement showing the warrant expenditure of each and every department of the government from the close of the last fiscal year to the 14th day of March instant, with the date of the issue of each warrant and the license for or on account of which the same was issued; also a statement in detail of any moneys paid or advanced by cheque or otherwise by the Bank of British North America or any other bank of government deposit. [The resolution calls for a variety of other information as to financial affairs, the object being to get a statement of the monetary situation up to the 14th March instant.]

Mr. Hanington gave notice of enquiry on Tuesday next of what acceptances had been given by any member of the government for public works.

Mr. Wilson introduced a bill establishing lien on logs and lumber.

Hon. Mr. Ryan submitted the Crown Land Department report.

House adjourned till Monday.

FREDERICTON, March 16.

Mr. Melanson gave notice of motion for a detailed statement of the amounts of

\$502.95 cents mentioned in the report of the Auditor General on page 47 as paid by the executive government for horse and coach hire. Such statement to show every date and service, including duration thereof, miles travelled, and the parties' names for the same was furnished respectively.

Mr. Atkinson gave notice of motion for a detailed statement showing all amounts due from this Province to any bank of banks at the beginning of 1891; also a statement in detail with items and dates of all sums placed in any bank or banks to the credit of the province during 1890; also the amounts with items and dates of all sums withdrawn from said banks or any of them during the year 1890, together with all loans obtained from said banks or any of them, with dates and amounts thereof; also the rate of interest paid by the province for money so on deposit; also the rate of interest paid by the province for any money obtained by the way of loan, said statement to include all transactions with banks above described for the year 1890, and also, date of the advance of \$95,000 to the province and the date of its repayment; also a detailed statement, including items and dates, of all transactions with banks or any of them by the government of this province or any officer in their behalf for the year 1891 up to the 14th March instant.

Recess till 2.30.

After recess Hon. Mr. Mitchell submitted a return of the civic indebtedness of the Northumberland municipality.

Vancouver, the youngest city of Canada, which is the British Columbia terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway seems likely to be a great city before many years. Vancouver has progressed at the rate of about 5,000 a year since fairly been established as a city. For the first year or two there was a considerable floating population which did not become permanent, so that the actual increase may be represented as follows: Population beginning of 1888, 3,000, at the beginning of 1889, 8,000, at the beginning of 1890 13,000 at the beginning of 1891, 18,000.

A month ago Mrs. Frank Bauer of Canton, Ohio, gave birth to a baby girl, for whom Mrs. Bauer's four-year-old son conceived an intense dislike, because, as he said, he wanted a little brother. The youngster has never missed an opportunity to maltreat his little sister, and yesterday the continued crying of the baby led the mother to make an examination, when she discovered that the great toe of the right foot had been bitten off at the joint. The four-year-old acknowledged his guilt.
