SPEECH:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of

Assembly: "I beg to extend to you my cordial greetings upon your again assembling for the performance of your important functions, and trust that the delay in convening the Legislature on this occasion which circumstances have rendered unavoidable, will not be found to occasion you any serious personal inconvenience.

"I am happy to say that His Excellency the Governor General was enabled to make the visit to the Maritime Provinces during recess which I had some reason to think he had in contemplation when I met you at the opening of last session. The recep-tion accorded to His Excellency in all parts of the Province to which his visit extended. was of the heartiest and most cordial character, and was, I am assured personally most gratifying to His Excellency.

"The selection on behalf of the Dominion government of a number of representative and prominent farmers from dif-ferent sections of the United Kingdom, who should visit Canada and report for the information of the English people upon its agricultural condition, capabilities and resources, led to an extended tour by these gentlemen through a large portion of the Dominion. My government, deeming it undesirable that the delegates should be allowed to return to the mother country without some of their number having paid a visit to New Bruswick, were able, although somewhat late in the season, to prevail upon several of the party to spend a few days in the Province, and I have every reason to believe that those who did so were greatly impressed with the agricultural capabilities of New Brunswick, and will speak most favorably of the Province in this regard in their

forthcoming report.

"The conditions which it is believed unhappily exist in agricultural communities in some portions of Great Britain are leading to a considerable emigration of the farming classes from that country, and my government, in the hope of diverting a portion of this emigration to our own Province, has commissioned a competent gentleman, himself a practical English farmer, who has enjoyed the advantage of a few years' residence in New Brunswick, to revisit England and lay before the people the inducements our province offers as a farming country. I am not without strong hopes that the result will be more than commensurate with the moderate outlay which the experiment has necessitated and shall look to you with confidence to sanction the action of my government in the step thus taken.

#### A Smuggler's Paradise

Looking at the map one may see that the northwest corner of the State of Washington is torn off, and the space that is left is filled with water, dotted with an archipelago. The island of Vancouver fits partially into the gaping corner as if it had been torn out by some gigantic convulsion. The tatters and debris of the rent form the archipelago. Our national interest centered in the corner long ago when that portion of the boundary was in dispute, and the tension of a war feeling was only relieved when a foreign arbitrator settled the boundary, and gave us the island of San Juan, the most important in the group. The city of Victoria confines nearly all the population on that corner of Vancouver Island; the city of Vancouver is the main settlement on the British Columbia shore; and on our borders are such little places as Whatcom, New Dunguness, and Port Angeles in the State of Washington. Port Townsend on Puget Sound, is the principal American town near by, and the headquarters of the scanty force of custom officials who are supposed to guard against the smuggling, and who are entitled to the presumption that they are doing their best in this direction. Victoria has only 20,000 population, Vancouver fewer still, and the islands only here and there a house. Deer abound upon these island, which are heavily timbered, and the waterways between them feel the keel of but few vessels-of none at all except the smallest craft outside the main channels. It would be hard to imagine a more difficult region to police, or a fairer field for smugglers. Old London itself has scarcely a greater tangle of crooked or confusing thoroughfares than this Archipelago posseses, and their waterways are so narrow and sheltered that mere oarsmen can safely and easily travel many of them. It is a smugglers paradise.

Those who transport the Chinamen are all white men. The resident Chinese act as their confederates and as the agents of the smuggled men, but do no part of the actual smuggling, that is to say the boating. The great smuggling is of opium.
