He was born in Prince Edward Island seventy-three years ago of Highland Scotch parents, educated at Quebec and ordained priest 48 years ago. Mrs. Grimwood adds that the British have little right to complain of the senaputty's treachery, inasmuch as the senaputty (second brother to the deposed Maharajah and commander-in-chief of the Manipuri forces) was invited by Chief Commissioner Quinton to attend the durbar with the direct intention of taking him unawares and placing him under asrest without bloodshed, which would, it is supposed, have resulted from an attempt to openly arrest that chieftain.

The senaputty, Mrs. Grimwood says, in some way or other became suspicious of Mr. Quinton's intentions, and, consequently, did not appear at the durbar.
