A DREADED BUT HARMLESS DAY.

In nearly all the European nations the first of May this year was looked forward to with a certain amount of apprehension. Workmen's organizations had planned great demonstrations for that day to strengthen their demand for an eight hours working day decreed by law.

It is not clear, however, that there were no grounds for the fears indulged in. On the part of the workmen at large concerned, probably no riotous demonstrations were intended or desired.

ANTIGONISH, April 30.—The right reverend Peter McIntyre, Roman Catholic bishop of Charlottetown, died to-night of heart disease at the residence of Bishop Cameron, where he arrived this afternoon on a visit.

A Bloody Vengeance.

CALCUTTA, April 30.—Mrs. F. St. C. Grimwood, the wife of Mr. Grimwood, late British political agent at Manipur, who was murdered when Chief Commissioner James W. Quinton and the other British officials lost their lives, has arrived here.

According to Mrs. Grimwood's account, the Manipur massacre was entirely due to the rashness of the Chief Commissioner Quinton in refusing to listen to sensible advice which was given him in regard to the negotiations being conducted with the natives concerning the deposition of the Maharajah.

Mrs. Grimwood adds that the British have little right to complain of the senaputty's treachery, inasmuch as the senaputty (second brother to the deposed Maharajah and commander-in-chief of the Manipuri forces) was invited by Chief Commissioner Quinton to attend the durbar with the direct intention of taking him unawares and placing him under arrest without bloodshed, which would, it is supposed, have resulted from an attempt to openly arrest that chieftain.

The senaputty, Mrs. Grimwood says, in some way or other became suspicious of Mr. Quinton's intentions, and, consequently, did not appear at the durbar. But the wily Manipuri, on the other hand, so well planned a checkmate movement that, instead of allowing the British commissioner to arrest him, he (the senaputty) arrested Mr. Quinton and his staff, and, it would seem by previous reports received, afterward allowed the Manipuris to wreak bloody vengeance upon his captives.

The New House of Commons.

A study of the list of members of the new House of Commons shows that there are 82 members who were not in the last Parliament, 69 of whom never sat in Parliament before, a greater number of new members it is believed, than after any other previous general election.

An Honest Debtor.

MONTREAL, May 2.—Chief Detective Cullen has received a letter dated Cairo, Egypt, from an officer of the British army who stated when in Montreal in 1894 he borrowed the sum of one hundred pounds from a Montreal merchant which he now desires to return.

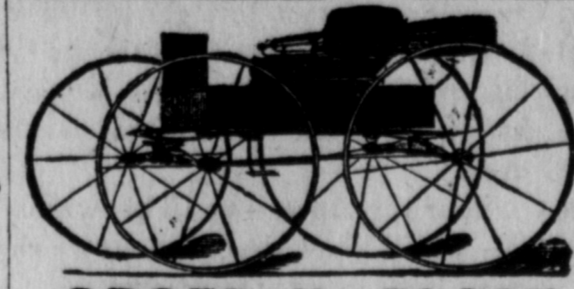
