

P., of London, and the bridegroom was Mohammedan barrister, practicing in London. Miss Fitch, who is a Protestant, was previously married at St. Giles', Camberwell, the Moslem ceremony taking place in Liverpool the same afternoon. This was performed by the Vice-President of the Moslem congregation, who was attired in a brilliant costume of silk and velvet. The bride repeated after him the words of the marriage contract : " stand here in the presence of God, and all who are assembled, to unite my heart to your heart, and my destiny to your destiny and to be called by your name. The Extravagance of Roman Women,

We read of Sarah Bernhardt bringing with her on her present visit to this country forty-five trunks with no fewer than a hundred gowns. That seems to us a wardrobe of extraodrinary wastefulness and luxury. Yet it would have seemed a meagre and shabby outfit to the great Roman ladies of the first century of our era. We are told on trustworthy authority that the dresses alone of Lollia Paulina, the rival of Agrippina, were valued at \$1,666,000. Pliny relates that he saw her at a plain citizen's bridal supper, litterly covered with pearls and emeralds worth forty million sesterces, equivalent in our money to \$1,560,000. Another lavish beauty of nearly the same epoch, Lollia Sabina, never travelled without a train of five hundred she-asses, so that she might not miss her morning's bath of asses' milk. .By the side of their Roman prototypes the most extravagant women of our own day seem thrifty.

A Singular Canal.

The most remarkable canal in the world is the one between Worsley and St Helen's in the north of England. It sixteen miles long and underground from end to end. In Lancashire the coal mines are very extensive, half the country being undermined, and many years ago the Duke of Bridgewater's managers thought shall be my happiness."
