Legislative Council.

FREDERICTON, April 11th.—An evening session was held for the consideration of the abolition bill. A full council was present and a number of visitors dropped in, although had it been known that the council were to take up the question of their own political destruction the attendance would have been much larger. The council never looked healthier in its life. The council chamber, which is a beautiful room, presented a charming appearance. Among the visitors was Attorney General Blair, who took the deepest interest in the progress of the bill.

A select committee of 10 members had been appointed to report upon the bill and after deliberation Hon. Mr. Hill, chairman, submitted the report signed by eight members of committee advising an addition to the bill of a section postponing its operation till the end of the first session in 1894.

Mr. Emmerson offered to submit a minority report of the committee recommending the adoption of the bill intact.

Hon. Mr. Jones, however, raised the point of order that the minority report could not be received under the rules of the house and after some debate the point was sustained.

The council then went into committee of the whole for the consideration of the bill, Hon. Mr. White in the chair. All sections of the bill were passed without discussion, when Mr. Hill moved as an amendment that an additional section be passed in accordance with the committee's report, postponing the operation of the bill for three years. A great deal of discussion arose pro and con regarding this amendment, nearly every councillor speak-
ing upon it and, as it seemed, with a minority in its favor.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson made a strong appeal against it, and this probably decided the question, for on the vote being taken it was found that the amendment was lost by two as follows:—

For Amendment.—Ryan, Flewelling, Hill, Jones, Bellamy, White and Woods—8

Against.—Young, Barberie, McManus, Baird, Ritchie, Fellows, Emmerson, Harrison, McLellan, LeBlanc.—10

Hon. Mr. McManus then moved a second saving clause that the bill comes in operation after one year, but succeeded in getting only three votes, McManus, Flewelling and Richard.

FREDERICTON, April 13.—This morning in the Legislative council when the bill for abolition came up for a third reading Hon. Mr. McManus moved a reconsideration. The house went into committee and Hon. Mr. Fellows moved the section providing that the council should cease to exist at the end of the present parliament in 1894, at the termination of the present House of Assembly in case dissolution should take place sooner.

This was carried ten to seven. Hon. Mr. Ritchie absent.

Fashionable Wedding.

(From Helenburgs and Gareloch (Scotland) Times of March 25, 1891.)

At the West Free Church, Helensburg yesterday (Tuesday) afternoon, the marriage was duly solemnized of Mr. Andrew Bonar Law, Seabank, and Miss Annie Pitcairn, eldest daughter of Mr. Harrington Robley, of Kintillo. The young couple being well known and much esteemed in the district, the beautiful church was thronged with friends and well-wishers. The choir seats were tastefully decorated with foliage plants, evergreens and wild daffodils. The bridegroom, attended by his "best man," Mr. John R. K. Law, Middlesborough, arrived in good time. On the bridal party entering the church, the choir, under the direction of Mr. Ashton sang the appropriate hymn—

"The voice that breathed o'er Eden,
That earliest wedding day,
That primal marriage blessing,
It hath not passed away."

After the ceremony, which was performed by Rev. Wm. Leitch, B. A., the benediction, "The Lord bless thee and keep thee," was sung, followed by the hymn—

"How welcome was the call,
And sweet the festival day."

The bride, who was given away by her father, looked exceedingly well in white corded silk, trimmed with pearl trimming chiffon and orange blossoms, with a veil of tulle. There were four charming bridesmaids, Misses Isabel, Margaret and Josephine Robley, sisters of the bride, and Miss Janet Law, sister of the bridegroom. These young ladies were dressed in yellow crepe-cloth and bengaline, with hats to match, and they carried bouquets of daffodils and mimosa. After the beautiful and interesting ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. Robley gave a reception at Kintillo to the invited guests, who rendered their hearty congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Law. The marriage presents were numerous, costly, and very handsome. Among other presents received by the bridegroom was a splendid marble timepiece, with side ornaments, from the staff of Messrs. William Jacks & Co., of which firm Mr. Law is a partner. (Mr. Law is a brother of Mr. Robert Law, of Kingston, and will be remembered by many of our readers.)

They Played Earber.

WASHINGTON, N. J., April 6.—Mrs. James MacNerney, of Karsville, left her three children, aged 9, 7 and 2½, the youngest a girl, at home while she went to the store yesterday. When she returned she found the baby lying on the floor in the kitchen covered with blood. A razor was by its side. The child was not dead, though she was very weak from loss of blood. Her little face was one mass of cuts and on the neck was a huge gash that barely missed the jugular vein. The other children were not to be found for a long while. They were finally discovered in a closet fast asleep, their little hands covered with blood. They explained to their mother that they had been playing barber with the baby, who would not keep still, and so was cut. They became frightened at the blood and hid themselves.

An Important Discovery.

PARIS, April 11.—A despatch from Oran says that an enormous reservoir of water, 120 feet below the surface, has been discovered at Elegolea, a small caravan station in the midst of the Sahara desert. The reservoir was discovered while a number of workmen were engaged in sinking a well at Elegolea. The shaft sunk already gives forty gallons of good clear water per minute and it is expected that this amount can readily be increased should it be found that a large quantity is necessary. The discovery is of the highest importance and will undoubtedly develop the caravan trade of Elegolea which is one of the stopping places in the Sahara desert of the caravans which travel across that region. This is the first time that water has been found at so slight a depth in Sahara.

The fund of \$2,500,000, which Mr. Peabody left for the poor of London, now amounts to over \$5,000,000.
