Once more the New York papers are

A Bad Case of Grip.

He was perfectly frantic and had stripped
all his clothing off. He was shackled upon
the train Monday but insisted upon wear-
ing a fur cap and muffler.—Bangor Com-
mercial.

A despatch from Thomasville, Ga., to
the Atlanta Constitution relates as a fact,
and no "fish" story, that Adam Wilson,
who lives in Florida, just across the line,
went down in his well to clear it out, the
water being muddy. On reaching the
bottom he discovered that the walls of his
well, that had hitherto been solid, had
caved, and caved badly, and to ascertain
the depth of the cave he ran the handle of
a grubbing hoe in, and to his great discom-
fort and utter amazement a huge alligator
made his appearance on the scene. Mr.
Wilson, being made principally of back-
bone and grit, did not once think of re-
treating, but fell upon the saurian with
his pick, and after a hasty but fierce struggle
succeeded in laying him out. The
alligator is said to have been eight feet
long.

While services were being conducted in
the cathedral at Haizen, Austria, on Sat-

bears internal evidence of being a second
class "fake."

the band of Iroquois who fought for British
connection in the war of 1812-15, is
dead, aged 94.

The Canadian cruisers will begin their
seasons work of protecting the fisheries,
about May 1st.

The King of all the lobsters has been
found. Last Thursday while Martin
Willey was tending his codfish trawls, 25

are not building many lobsters that
size now-a-days, much to the sorrow of
the solid fanciers.—Bangor Commercial.

Steamer advices from Sydney state that
the British ship "St. Catharic" has been
wrecked off the Caroline Islands. Ninety
persons were drowned.

Ontario's 43 sheriffs receive annually in
fees an average of \$2,145 each. 18 of them
receive from that amount upward, the
summit being capped with \$8,805. Some
of those who are less liberally paid receive
but \$600 or \$700 each. Such are the
inequalities of the fee system.

Mrs. Eunice Brown, of North Anson,
Me., committed suicide by jumping into
a well in the cellar of her brother's house.
