

What They are Like.

To properly understand the class of men who make up the Italian population of the U. S. in large measure the following description taken from a leading American magazine will prove valuable: "There is just now seeking these shores, in extraordinary numbers, a class of laborers who live more meanly than the imagination of the general public, in well paid and well fed America, can conceive. Everyone who has visited the northern shore of the Mediterranean, in Italy, is familiar with the class called Lazzaroni. It may be actually said that this class does not live in houses at all, does not know what a house means, except for shelter against inclement weather; that it has no use for roofs at all. Water, except as it falls from Heaven, it appears to know not in any external sense. A gang of these people, "dagoes" they are nicknamed, employed in building an American railroad, will find it necessary in the new climate, to be provided with quarters of some sort; will herd together as tightly as they can dispose themselves in anything which is covered by a roof, and every office of nature will be performed in the same tumbled quarters. This "dago" not only herds, but fights. The knife with which he cuts his bread he also uses to lop off another Dago's finger or ear or to slash another's cheek. He quarrels over his meals; and his game whatever it is which he plays with pennies after his meal is over, is carried on knife at hand. If a dago in his sleep rolls up against another dago the two whip out their knives and settle it there and then."

They Cleaned Out the Circus.

A special from Knoxville, Tenn., says that at a circus show there Thursday the audience became displeased at the actions of the performers and began to jeer them. The crowd became more and more excited and finally made a rush for the performers, several of whom were handled very roughly. The audience grew riotous and smashed everything in sight, broke the seats and cut the ropes, the tent falling on the heads of the 200 people present. They then made for the dressing rooms, which were also torn down, leaving the actors and actresses half dressed in the open air. The side shows were next attacked and wrecked. After wrecking everything about the place the crowd dispersed and the show people, aided by the police, gathered their traps together and left on the midnight train. Some twenty people were hurt, but none seriously, except the clown, whose jaw was broken.

Estranged From the Mother Land.

LONDON, April 16.—The delegates from Newfoundland, now in this city, with the object of impressing Newfoundland's side of the lobster fisheries question upon the British Parliament, during the course of a joint interview to-day said in substance that there was no doubt that circumstances of a comparatively recent occurrence had created a very friendly feeling in Newfoundland towards the United States whose action had been attractive to the colony. Newfoundland would deeply regret estranging itself from the mother country but nevertheless the existing impatience would if followed by our failure to successfully present Newfoundland's views to the imperial parliament, deepen the alienation, the effect of which would be difficult to foresee. There would never be the same friendly feeling however towards England as there had hitherto been.

Sad to Think of it.

ROME, April 16.—In the Chamber of Deputies to-day the Marquis Diridine speaking on the New Orleans lynching said that Italy could not admit the irresponsibility of the United States in regard to the acts of single states of the union. He said he did not fear political difficulties between Italy and the United States but it was a matter of regret that so highly civilized a country as the United States should not fulfil the duties of justice and morality.

Not a "Fake" Journal.

"Is it another fake?" is a question the friends of the Dominion Illustrated have frequently to answer with regard to the prize competition inaugurated by the publishers of that journal for the current six months. The publishers have themselves given the best answer to that by publishing the list of prizes. There are 100, aggregating in value over \$3,000. The first is \$750 in gold and the smallest is valued at \$5. Fire broke out early Sunday morning in the Chipman building, a five story brick structure, on Court and Hanover streets, Boston, principally occupied by Bailey & Rankin, carpet dealers, who sustain the larger portion of the loss. The loss on the building is estimated at \$5,000 and to tenants \$15,000, all covered. While the fire was at its height the roof fell without warning, imprisoning nearly 20 firemen, including Chief Engineer Webber and three district chiefs. Seventeen, including the officers, were hurt, but none dangerously.

An English Beauty.

A few years ago Mrs. Cornwallis-West and Mrs. Langtry were the rival professional beauties of London society. Mrs. Cornwallis-West was an Irish woman, whose sparkling wit gave her a strong advantage over Mrs. Langtry. It was irresistible, and not the swells alone, but scientists, men of letters, and theologians were among her ardent admirers. At the last drawing room the prettiest debutante was probably Miss Cornwallis-West. Her gown was of white satin, made in the empire style. There were no flowers or feathers on it; the only trimming on the skirt was two or three fluffy frills. The short-waisted bodice was adorned by a sash of diaphanous white stuff. This severely simple gown was in striking contrast to the other presentation gowns. They were nearly all decorated with spring flowers—snow-drops, lilies of the valley, apple blossoms, or white lilac—and half fantastic bodices. Miss West carried a pretty posy of white flowers, the loose chains of which nearly touched the hem of her skirt. All the new posies—there were several—were finished off with long loops and ends of ribbon and trails of ferns or mosses. A few ladies had posies composed of foliage. They were made of caladium leaves, asparagus fern and smilax.

From the effects of poison taken at the wedding of Mr. Snooks and Miss Herr at Lyndon, Ky., Wednesday evening, B. Frank Guthrie, one of the wealthiest residents of Louisville died Saturday morning. Fourteen of the guests are ill. Every symptom of the sufferers indicate arsenic, and if the physicians are correct in their diagnosis, a most diabolical crime has been committed. Mr. and Mrs. Snooks started on their bridal tour soon after the wedding, were taken suddenly ill in Cincinnati on Thursday and compelled to return home. The condition of both is now said to be critical.

While blasting rock on the Columbia and Kootenay branch of the C. P. R., a heavy blast being slow in discharging, the employees returned from their place of safety and proceeded to work again. Seeing smoke issuing from the crevices in the rock they started to run, but the cliff beneath them heaved and split, a terrific explosion occurring, and big rocks falling on some of the party. James Ryan, Justus Matheson, and Henry, Martin were killed and August Johnson was terribly lacerated. McLennon and foreman Smith were knocked unconscious.
