LOCAL LEGISLATURE.
The Bills that have been Assented to.

FREDERICTON, April 16.
 This morning the Legislature was prorogued. The Lieutenant Governor assented to the following bills:—

To provide for the repairs and improvements of roads and bridges and other public works and services.
 To provide for defraying certain expenses of the civil government of the province.

In further amendment of chap. 65 of the consolidated statutes of schools, so far as relates to the city of Fredericton.

To authorize the municipality of the county of Restigouche to issue debentures for the purpose of building a new jail.
 Respecting St. Paul's Presbyterian church, of Woodstock.

To enable the trustees of St. David's church, St. John, to issue debentures on the security of their corporate property in the said city of St. John.

To amend an act to incorporate the Keystone Fire Insurance Company of St. John, and to increase the capital stock thereof.

To authorize the county council of the municipality of Gloucester to exempt creameries and cheese factories from taxation.

To authorize the Common Council of the city of St. John to grant exemptions from civil taxation in certain cases.

To amend 52nd Victoria, chapter 44, intitled an act to authorize the county council of the municipality of York to assess in aid of Victoria Hospital, in the city of Fredericton.

To authorize the county council of the municipality of York to issue debentures to take up other debentures.
 In amendment of chapter 37 of the consolidated statutes relating to proceedings and practice in the supreme court.
 Relating to mines and minerals.

To authorize a loan to meet the cost of importation of cattle and sheep.
 To continue and amend an act to incorporate the Chamcook Water Company.

To incorporate the Church of the Messiah, in the city of St. John.
 Respecting the office of Queen's printer and the public printing.

To amend chap. 65 of the consolidated statutes of schools, and chap. 64 of the consolidated statutes of the University of New Brunswick.

To further facilitate the construction of public works.
 To amend the New Brunswick election act of 1889.

To extend the powers of the Madawaska Log Driving Company, of Maine, to the provincial waters of the River St. John above Grand Falls.

To authorize the county council of the municipality of Charlotte to issue debentures for wharf and warehouse purposes at St. Andrews, and to provide for the redemption and payment of such debentures and interest by assessment in certain portions of the parish of St. Andrews.

To alter the time for holding the second semi-annual meeting of the county council in the municipality of Carleton.

To authorize an annual assessment on the city of St. John for ferry purposes.

To legalize and confirm the grant to the St. Croix cotton mill of letters patent under the New Brunswick joint stock companies' letters patent act, and for other purposes.

To empower the Carleton County Agricultural Society to sell and convey or mortgage any land owned by the said society.

In amendment of an act intitled an act to consolidate and amend certain acts incorporating and relating to the St. John Protestant Orphan Asylum.

To authorize the trustees of School District, No. 16, Bathurst, Gloucester county, to issue debentures.

To amend an act, 48th Vic., chap. 48, intitled an act to incorporate the Telegraph Publishing Co. of St. John.

To authorize the municipality of Charlotte county to sell and convey certain school lands situate at Seal Cove, in the parish of Grand Manan.

To amend and continue in force an act to incorporate the Restigouche and Victoria Colonization Railway Co.

In addition to the law relating to the city of St. John and the local government of the said city.
 Respecting railways.

To confirm a certain agreement made by the New Brunswick Railway Co. with the Canadian Pacific Railway Co.

To amend chap. 22 of 41 Vic., intitled an act to incorporate the Moncton Gas Light and Water Co.

To incorporate the Eastern Railway Co. in aid of the construction of railways.
 To incorporate the Western Railway Co.
 To render valid certain debentures issued by the county council of the municipality of Victoria, and to authorize assessments to pay said debentures.

To authorize the city of St. John to aid the construction of wharves and warehouses in connection with railway terminal facilities in the northern part of said city, on the eastern side of the harbor.

To incorporate the Hopewell Cemetery Co.

In addition to and in amendment of the act 46th Vic., chap. 62, intitled an act to continue and amend the act to incorporate the Northwest Boom Co.

To amend chap. 9 of the consolidated statutes of municipalities.

To authorize the town council of the town of Campbellton to provide a system of water works for said town, and to amend the act of incorporation of the said town of Campbellton.

To amend an act to incorporate the St. John Gas Light Co.

Relating to the parish of Woodstock civil court.

Relating to the Provincial Lunatic Asylum and its management, and the property of lunatics.

To provide for the appointment of a commission to investigate and report upon the sleep industry of the province.

To authorize the sale of certain lands and premises in district No. 2, in Dorchester, in Westmorland Co., held for school purposes.

To alter the time for holding the annual election for councillors in the several parishes of the city and county of St. John.

To amend chap. 20 of 47th Vic., intitled an act to incorporate the New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society, and to regulate the sale of drugs and medicines.

In amendment of several acts relating to the town of Milltown in the county of Charlotte.

To incorporate the St. Stephen Electric Street Railway Co.

To further continue an act to incorporate the Restigouche Boom Co.

Relating to the Legislative Council.

Relating to the Grundy Charity as vested in the commissioners of the alms house and work house of the city and county of St. John.

To authorize the extension of the line of the Intercolonial railway from the deep water terminus in Sydney ward, in the city of St. John, along public streets to the harbor front in Duke's ward.

To amend chap. 60 of 47th Vic., intitled an act to incorporate the Union Baptist Educational Society.

To define the boundaries of the city of Moncton.

In further amendment of the law relating to the police establishment in the city of St. John.

To enable the Independent Order of Foresters to deposit a portion of their reserve fund with the receiver general.

To amend chap. 38 of the consolidated statutes of arrest, imprisonment and examination of debtors.

To provide for the registry of decrees and orders of all foreign courts of chancery, equity and other courts of record.

Relating to the collectors of rates and constables of Kent county.

To enable aliens to acquire, hold, and convey real estate in this province.

In amendment of act 31st Vic., chap. 27, intitled an act relating to the appointment of coroners for the city and county of St. John.

The civic debt of Toronto is \$12,599,680. Besides this there is a local improvement debt of \$4,319,023. The sinking fund amounts to \$1,697,160. There is also a floating debt of about half a million.

Microbes under the Nails.
 This is a common belief that the finger nails are poisonous, which idea is natural enough, says the Boston Post, considering the fact that scratches made by them are generally quite irritable and much inclined to unusual inflammation.

The reasoning is erroneous, however, for as far as is known the nails themselves do not have any poisonous properties. The trouble excited by them is due to the foreign deposits under them. In other words, if one keeps his finger nails clean, scratches caused by them will be no more irritable than those produced by any like instrument that is considered innocent.

The results of the examinations made in Vienna show that it is more important that the finger nails should be kept clean than any one would suppose. Seventy-eight were made and there were found thirty kinds of micrococci, eighteen different bacilli and three kinds of sarcinae besides common mold spores were present in many instances.

It would seem from this that the spaces under the finger nails were favorable hiding places for the minute organisms which are more or less prejudicial to health, and that therein lies the poisonous element attributed to the nails. Furthermore, that cleanliness of the nails is a very important essential. It is not sufficient to use merely a knife blade, but at the toilet a nail brush and plenty of soap and water should be called into service.

Surgeons long ago learned that deposits under the nails were a menace, and that through them wounds were easily poisoned. This led to extreme care in the matter of personal cleanliness on their own part, and on the part of all their assistants.

Before an operation is performed, all who touch the patient or the instruments which are to be used, must be thoroughly cleansed with soap and water, being especially careful to have the spaces under the nails absolutely clean. After this the hands are put into disinfectant solutions.
