

-At a meeting of representative citizens held at Chatham last Thursday it was unanimously resolved to celebrate Dominion day in Chatham in fine style. Water sports, horse races, open air concerts, fireworks, etc., will be provided in abundance, and as all Miramichi will be invited to co-operate, the celebration will be a big

-A French boat with boiled lobsters, undersized and berried, (or full of spawn). were being sold at the Muirhead wharf. A good many citizens escaped the fine of \$20 each, as well as the vendor, who hoisted sail and put to sea, when he heard that the fishery officer was on his track. Lobsters 9 inches and over without berries, may be legally sold in the market .-World.

-The yacht "Good Intent" arrived at Richibucto from Miramichi on Saturday last. She is Mr. L. O. Armstrong, the lecturer's vessel and carries a party of five on board including the captain and crew. She is a trim little craft, 27 feet in length and 8 ft. 10 inches beam. Mr. Armstrong purposes making a tour of the Maritime Provinces in his little craft and left Tuesday morning for Summerside, where he will deliver his next lecture.

-The Dominion fisheries report has just been issued. The total value of fisheries for 1890 is given as \$17,714,902, as against \$17,655,256 in 1889, showing an increase of \$59,646.30. The total value of the marine fur fisheries in the Behring Sea and adjoining waters was \$510,111, showing a total catch of 54,853 seals. The number of fur seals caught by foreign vessels and disposed of in Victoria was 3,474, of which all but 294 were caught in Behring Sea. The total value of the Canadian seal catch was increased \$177,-651, owing to the advance of \$1 per skin and an increase of 11,181 skins in the

-The lecture, illustrated with lime ight views, "To Ireland and Back," giver by Mr. Armstrong in St. Patrick's hall on Monday evening was attended by a large andience and was intensely interesting and listened to with rapt attention throughout. Starting in British Columbia Mr. Armstrong gave a number of views of lumbering and fishing operations on the Pacific, after which he started east on his journey, and for about two hours took his audience with him through Canada to to Ireland, giving many beautiful and interesting scenes on the way. 
