The balloon was sent up at 3 p. m.; an immense crowd of people attended the ascension. A large gathering of the best people went to the depot to see Dr. Ayer off and shake hands with him. He arrived here on Monday, accompanied by his financial partner Dr. J. A. Bouthillier and his entire company. They opened up in the hall Monday night and kept the the audience in a roar of laughter.
