Some Very Old Pronunciations.

"Laylock," the pronunciation of lilac once very common, has now almost entirely passed away. It is hardly likely to be found in dictionaries or glossaries, except such as profess to give provincial variations of spelling. Sixty years ago, however, it was by no means a provincialism or a mark of the uneducated. I well remember that Walter Savage Landor always spoke of "Laylocks," as did my own mother and most people of that generation. It belonged to the age, now almost entirely passed away, which called Rome "Room," gold "goold," St. James "St. Jeames," with other variations of sound now deemed vulgar. I have heard my father say that George IV. always spoke of "My loyal city of Lunnon," while "obfeeged" and "cow-cumber" were heard from the most refined mouths.

I can distinctly remember on the first Sunday in advent, 1825, hearing the officiating clergyman at St. Mary Woolnoth give out sonorously, when reading the first lesson, "like a lodge in a garden of cowcumpers," and my dear old rector, Julius Charles Hare, twenty years later, adopted the same pronunciation, saying at table, "Oblege by passing the cow-cumber." "Vilets," as a dissyllable for violets, was equally common among people of good education.

Educational Circular.

The Chief Superintendent of Education has issued the following circular to teachers:—

1. **CLOSE OF TERM.**—With the consent of the trustees, Saturday, December 17th, may be substituted for Friday, Dec. 23rd, in order to enable teachers to reach their homes before Christmas. The first teaching day in the term will be Monday, January 9th, 1893.

2. **SCHOOL RETURNS.**—To maintain uniformity in making up general average percentage, etc., the following methods shall be observed:

(a) **LOST DAYS.**—When a pupil has been once enrolled he shall be regarded as belonging to the school until the teacher shall have received reliable information, either by notice from parent or guardian, or other authoritative source, that the pupil will not probably return to the school during the rest of the term. In such case the absence of the pupil from the date of his enrollment to the date of notice of withdrawal, shall be reckoned as his lost days for the term.

(b) **TARDINESS.**—Pupils who come to the school by railways, or other public conveyances, and who cannot reach the school until after the hour of opening, shall not be marked as tardy in the usual column. In such cases an asterisk preceding the names of such pupils may direct attention to a foot-note explaining the circumstances.

3. **TEXT-BOOKS.**—(a) The New Brunswick edition of Spottan's High School Botany will be published early in January; but Gray's How Plants Grow may continue to be used for the term of 1893.

(b) A new edition of the Modern school Geography will be published early in January. As the new edition will differ in some respects from the old, care must be observed to avoid, as far as possible, inconvenience and expense in the transition from one to the other. It is desirable that the new edition be introduced into all the schools as early as may be consistent, with due regard to the interests of both parents and children.

(c) The subject in English Literature for first class in 1893 is "Selections from Tennyson; with introduction and note by J. E. Waterell, B. A." Gage & Co., Toronto.

4. **SCHOOL MANUAL.**—A new edition of the School Manual is now passing through the press, and will be issued early in the new year. Copies will be mailed to trustees and teachers throughout the province. The edition of 1887 is now exhausted, and can no longer be supplied by the department.

Changes in Pronunciation.

Pronunciation is slowly but steadily changing. Sometimes it is going further and further away from the orthography; for example, *either* and *neither* are getting more and more to have in their first syllable the long *e* sound instead of the long *a* sound which they had once. Sometimes it is being modified to agree with the orthography; for example, the older pronunciations of *again* to rhyme with *men* and of *been* to rhyme with *pen*, in which I was carefully trained as a boy, seem to me to be giving way before a pronunciation in exact accord with the spelling, *again* to rhyme with *pain*, and *been* to rhyme with *seen*. These two illustrations are from the necessarily circumscribed experience of a single observer, and the observation of others may not bear me out in my opinion; but though the illustrations fall to the ground, the main assertion, that pronunciation is changing, is indisputable.—Harper's Magazine.
