

**LOCAL & GENERAL.**

**SUPREME COURT.**—Before the Supreme Court at Fredericton last week, judgement was given in *doe dem. Girvan vs. McLean*. The court ordered the taxation of costs in this case to be set aside.

**PROBATE COURT.**—At a session of the Probate Court held here last Tuesday before Judge H. H. James, Mrs. M. E. Thompson, administratrix with the will of the late John J. Thompson, of Weldford, annexed proved said will in solemn form. The objection was taken that the will had not been properly attested, for the reason that the name of one of the witnesses had been written by a third party at the request, and in the presence of witness. Judgement reserved. Phinney & Carter, proctors of administratrix. A. P. Barnhill, of St. John, for heirs and next of kin.

**COUNTY COURT.**—The October term of the County Court of Kent opened here Tuesday. Judge Landry presiding. The Queen vs. Alexander Maillet, for forgery, was the only criminal case entered. Mr. Phinney, Q. C., for prisoner, challenged the array of jurors, and the Crown attorney consented that the trial stand over till next term.

The only civil cause entered was *Robichaud vs. Breaux*. This was undecided. Girouard for plaintiff.

His Honor then gave judgement in *Long vs. McKinnon*, and *Hall vs. McLaren*, argued last term. In *Long vs. McKinnon* the verdict was sustained and a new trial refused. The motion for judgement as in case of a non suit in *Hall vs. McLaren* was dismissed without costs.

**PRESENTATION TO MR. COX.**—Chatham World: "The Northumberland County Teachers' Institute determined, on learning of Mr. Philip Cox's intention to leave the county to accept a position in St. John, to give him a tangible evidence of the esteem in which all his professional brethren hold him. A handsome gold watch, suitably engraved, was purchased for him, and an address prepared. The address was most beautifully engrossed, and illuminated in water colors by the sisters of the convent in Chatham, who offered to do it as a labor of love when they learned that the address was to be presented, and it was framed and glazed. The presentation was made in Masonic Hall, which was full of school children and their parents. Inspector Mersereau read the address and Miss McLaughlan made the presentation. The Newcastle teachers gave him a valuable inkstand, the pupils of Harkins Academy a gold-headed cane, and the pupils of the Newcastle schools a gold watch chain, with addresses. Mr. Cox acknowledged the gifts and replied to the addresses in a felicitous, eloquent and feeling style. For felicity of expression, orderly arrangement of ideas and fluency of delivery, Mr. Cox has few equals, and he would shine on any platform as an orator. Many presentations and addresses are due to the canvassing of zealous friends, and are not deserved by those who receive them. But such is not the case in this instance. Mr. Cox is as modest as he is deserving. He is an ideal teacher and citizen, a scholar and a gentleman. His soul is in his profession, and he is an earnest student as well as teacher. Mr. Cox has gone to St. John to take a place on the grammar school staff and we congratulate the boys of that historic school. We also congratulate Mr. Cox. Newcastle is too small a place for a man of his talents to stay in."

Some three or four months ago Baron Hirsch distributed all his earnings on the turf for the previous year, amounting to \$70,000, among deserving English charities. He has since accumulated fresh profits from the races won by his horses, and he intimates that a further sum of 100,000, will be available for charitable purposes at the beginning of 1893.

A somewhat horrible case has come before Judge Mathieu in the Montreal Superior court. In October, 1890, Madame Alphonse Leblanc died, after leaving all her jewellery and \$400 to her sister, Mrs. Melina Tessier. It is alleged that the husband of the dead woman purposely buried her with all her jewellery on in order to prevent her sister getting possession of the trinkets. Mrs. Tessier consequently sued in court for the recovery of them, and it now looks as if the dead woman must be exhumed and her watch, bracelets and necklace stripped off the corpse, or else her husband must go to jail for contempt of court, for the judge decided that if any one maliciously put valuables in a coffin, recovery of them is legal.

The possibility that electricity may be applied to common carriages is fast becoming a probability. Already important experiments have been made on these lines. An electrical carriage is now being operated on the streets of Chicago, actuated by a strong battery. Chicago is well adapted to experiments of this character, by reason of the absence of stiff grades on its streets. The inventor has not yet solved the problem of storage traction, but as a beginning his experiments are encouraging. Experiments, too, of a similar character have been made in Boston, a Brookline man being the proud possessor of such an electrical carriage. A proposition for the use of some such electrical vehicle was among those that were presented to the Rapid Transit Commission during its sessions a year ago in Boston.
