She told Mrs. Strong that morning that she did not feel quite as well as usual; still, she ate a hearty breakfast, but shortly afterwards she complained of a terrible pain about her heart. Mrs. Strong hastened to another part of the house to find something to relieve the pain, but almost immediately upon her return her sister died. The funeral of the deceased took place Wednesday afternoon, the services at the house and at the grave being conducted by Rev. Mr. Maggs, pastor of the Methodist church here, assisted by Rev. Wm. Buctouche, Oct. 31.—While a number of young men were partridge shooting on Friday in the woods about two miles from the town, they found four empty whisky cases, which were no doubt the remains of the recent fire. The smuggling schooner St. Martin's Packet, which was seized some time ago for smuggling, and whose masts and rigging were destroyed by the recent fire is still lying on the bank. The boys threaten to make a bonfire out of it.

Some thirteen buildings have been erected since the fire and others are in course of erection. Mr. C. During the evening the man in question visited the hotel apparently very drunk and commenced fighting. He was forcibly ejected by the owner after which he proceeded to a gentleman's establishment a short distance away. Upon entering the latter store, Mr. —, who did not want him about his premises, stated that he was going to close up and had a stove to clean. The man in question upon departing made the remark, "You need not bother cleaning your stove, it will be clean enough before morning." Within three hours after this the whole place was in flames.
