THE DISSOLUTION.

As was generally expected the local legislature has been dissolved, and the people of this province are called upon to select new representatives. The reason given by the attorney-general for the dissolution is not generally believed to be the true one. Mr. Blair has not in the past shown himself to be so desirous of avoiding unnecessary expenditure as to lead people to believe that his sole object in dissolving the house now is a desire to avoid the expense that would result from holding another session of the Legislative Council. The true reason is probably his great desire to snatch a lease of power for four years longer before the people have had an opportunity to examine the public accounts and acquaint themselves with the true condition of the public finances. It is well known that the government was compelled last session to acknowledge a deficit for the then past year. Since then affairs are said to have gone on from bad to worse, until the province is almost on the verge of bankruptcy. It can be easily understood, then, why Mr. Blair is eager to have the elections over before the public has been enlightened as to the true state of the financial affairs of the province. For this reason the contest has been brought on nearly two years before the time fixed by law. The opposition, however, appear to be on the alert, and there is every reason to believe that not a single seat now held by the government will be allowed to go uncontested. This province cannot afford to stand four more years of extravagance and corruption, and friends of honest and economical government should take care that Mr. Blair and his allies are relegated to back seats, and the administration of affairs given to honest men.

In this county the government party is badly disorganized, and present indications are that the opposition candidates will secure an easy victory. Mr. Phinney has issued his card to the electors and will be a candidate for re-election. He has for the past five years earnestly striven to look after the best interests of his county and in so doing has often come in collision with Mr. Blair. He has taken a front place in the ranks of the opposition, and there is probably no man in the house whom Mr. Blair would more gladly see defeated than Mr. Phinney. The people of Kent have, however, twice elected him at the head of the poll, and there is every reason to believe that they will not now withdraw their confidence from him. The name of his colleague has not yet been announced. Mr. Gogain, who appears to be the choice of the Liberal Conservatives of the county for the Dominion vacancy, is said to be more eager to enter local politics, and if so, he will no doubt join Mr. Phinney, thus leaving the Dominion seat open to other aspirants. One thing is certain, a square opposition ticket will be named, and, in all probability, elected.

As we said before, affairs appear to be at sixes and sevens in the government camp here. Mr. Legere has announced himself for re-election, but has not yet decided as to who his colleague will be. It is understood that he has offered that honor to several, but has been so far met with refusal. A most determined effort was made to induce Mr. James D. Irving, of Buctouche, to join the government ticket. Mr. Irving is a young man of good business ability, and is deservedly popular in his own locality. He undoubtedly would have brought the government some strength in the southern end of the county, at he has flatly refused to be a candidate. The latest report is that Mr. James Barnes, of Little Buctouche, has been selected. We are not in a position to say what Mr. Barnes' strength may amount to in Buctouche, but in this part of the county probably not one in twenty has ever before heard of the gentleman.

Against Mr. Legere personally we have not one word to say, but we deem it our duty to criticize his political course, and point out his political mistakes. It is true that he has occupied a seat in the legislature for only one session, but during that time he has done some things that would mar the political career of a much abler man. He was elected on the express understanding that an additional representative would be given to this county, yet when a resolution containing that provision was introduced by the opposition, he recorded his vote directly against it. We understand he gives as an excuse for his vote on that occasion, that Mr. Blair pro-

posed him there would be another session before the general election, and that then a similar measure would be introduced and carried. We have no doubt Mr. Legere is correct in his statement, but it only goes to show that he is too easily gulled to make a creditable representative. If Mr. Blair is able to so humbug him as to induce him to record his vote against his own interests and the interests of his county, then we assert that Mr. Legere is not the man to represent us. We want men who are not so easily taken in as Mr. Legere appears to have been. Then, again, his vote on the direct tax bill and other iniquitous measures demands an explanation that we do not believe Mr. Legere can give.

Apart from these difficulties, the government ticket will have to encounter other and even more serious ones. A number of Mr. Blair's strongest supporters in the past in this county are dissatisfied with the course the government has of late been pursuing, and are inclined to express their dissatisfaction by their votes. They feel that they have been most shabbily treated by the government, and we would not be surprised to see them and their friends out in open revolt against it. Should they decide to do so the government may as well abandon all hopes of carrying Kent.

In Westmorland Hon. A. D. Richard has been appointed solicitor general, and will head the government ticket. An opposition meeting is called for Thursday when it is expected Messrs. Powell, Melanson, Sumner and Wells will be nominated as an opposition ticket. With these men in the field against him, Mr. Richard's chances would not appear to be particularly bright. The names of his colleagues have not yet been announced. Mr. McQueen will not be one of them. Mr. Emmeron will be appointed chief commissioner of the Board of Works, and will contest Albert County.

As we go to press it is announced that Mr. Goguen will join Mr. Phinney.

Obituary.

BIG COVE, Sept. 24th, 1892.—One of the oldest persons in the province slept peacefully away at her grandson's, Abram Clare. Angeline Tymas, at the advanced age of 110 years. She was born in Miramichi, and she never wearied of telling when she came to Kent. There were only three houses where the town of Richibucto now stands. She leaves no family, having all died years ago. Once, when crossing the Miramichi river, in the fall of the year with her two children on a dog sled, the sled broke through the ice, and her children were drowned. She was blind for the last 2 years, and was in her usual good health, until 2 days before she died. Her memory wandered back to olden times, and the companions of her youth, of whom she never ceased to talk, until she calmly fell asleep to awaken in the Happy Hunting Ground, with those who were gone before.

Cotesville.

SEPT. 25th.—The fine weather for the past month has enabled the farmers to save their grain crops in splendid condition. Although not as good as last year, grain will be a fair yield. Generally speaking, potatoes are a failure, owing to the ravages of the bugs.

Mr. J. E. Coates has commenced grinding, and he has already ground a large quantity of grain. He has had his mill repaired by Mr. J. Doig, of New Scotland, who is an experienced millwright. Mr. Coates has shipped all his deal for the season, which was the largest shipment ever made from here in one season. He is rapidly coming to the front as our leading farmer, as well as our leading millman, and there is no reason why he should not, as he owns about one thousand acres of the best land in this parish. He raised about all the hay and oats this season that he will require for his lumbering business the coming winter. There will be a large amount of bark shipped from here this season.

Rumor says that P. J. Nowlan and P.

D. Landry will contest the parish for municipal honors this fall, it is also rumored that the present councillors will not run again. Should this be so, Messrs. Nowlan and Landry will likely be elected by acclamation.

The Rev. Mr. Scott is absent at present attending a convention of the brethren in Nova Scotia.

Mr. F. W. Steeves who has been home from Lynn, Mass., for a few weeks will return shortly. He has abandoned the idea of erecting a pulp factory at present. He says the wood here is all that could be desired for this purpose, but he cannot obtain a suitable site for a location.

Among the Conservatives here John B. appears to be the favorite for the vacant seat at Ottawa.

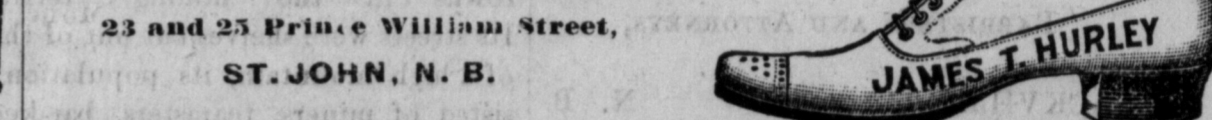
