TION. The advent to power of the Liberal party of Great Rritain is an event of more interest to colonists than is generally supposed. Every Liberal administration for the last sixty years has been accused of a desire to detach the colonies from the empire. These accusations have been again and again made in parliament and despite the denials which have sometimes been made there is a general opinion throughout the country that the party now at the head of affairs would be only too willing to cast the colonies adrift if they could bring forward some reasonable excuse for so doing. It is not, of course, to be inferred that all Liberals share in this desire. On the contrary there have been many strong expressions of disapproval of such a policy from prominent members of the party. Lord Kimberley and Mr. Mundella both members of the present administration have always been strong advocates of colonial connection, and have at various times taken occasion that attributed to them. This difference in the colonial policies of the two parties is perhaps greater now than in 1872 and as the Radical element appears to be growing stronger in each successive parliament, the day is possibly not very far distant when Canada will be called upon to pursue her onward course independent of the mother country.

THE CHOLERA.

The report that in Europe cholera has reached the shores of the Atlantic has aroused a feeling of uneasiness in Canada and the United States. A call has gone forth to the authorities to take immediate steps toward securing adequate quarantine defenses against the dreaded disease. The ports of Hamburg and Antwerp have constant and direct communication with this side of the Atlantic, and those whose business it is to attend to the matter cannot be in too great a hurry in taking prompt and decisive action. In Great Britain a regulation went into force last week providing for a most strict and searching inspection and examination of all vessels arriving from continental Europe. Despite these precautions several cases of the disease are reported in England and Scotland. The American government is rendering every possible assistance to the health boards of the different cities of the United States in their efforts to provide means to prevent the introduction of the disease and it is to be hoped our government will be equally active in coming to the assistance of the health officers in the different parts of the Dominion. Several vessels are expected to arrive at this harbor from European ports within the next two or three week; and the health officers here should take all necessary steps to have made a thorough and searching examination to make sure that no trace of the disease is on board before any of the crew are allowed to land.


