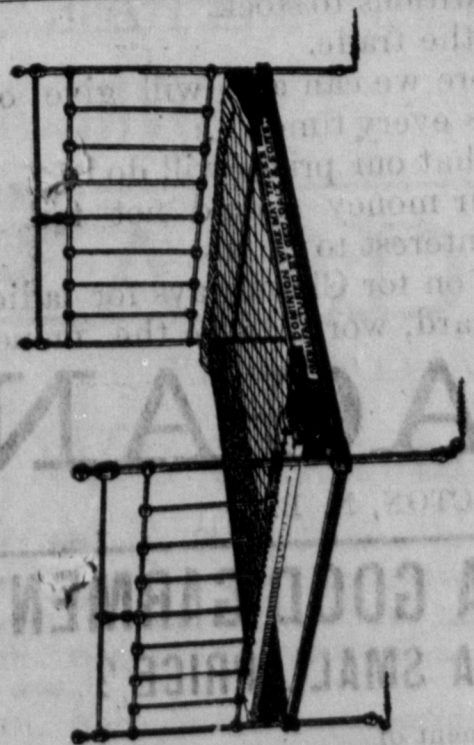

—At St. John on Thursday as Robert Henderson, a lunatic belonging to Kent Junction, who had escaped from the asylum, was walking on the track near Sand Cove, he was struck by the engine of a picnic train. The wheels passed over his body causing instant death.

—Bark "Peter" arrived at this port from Santos last Saturday. Health officer Dr. Bourque boarded her before any of the crew were allowed to land, to ascertain if any yellow fever was on board. No trace of the disease could be found. The captain reports that the disease is still raging at Santos.

—A few days ago lightning struck the Wynatsville, N. Y. Reformed church, a few minutes after the close of a prayer meeting, and paralyzed the pastor who was extinguishing the lights after the worshippers had dispersed. Out west the other day a man, who had just asserted that there was no God, was struck by lightning and killed.

—The funeral of the late J. W. Hains, conductor, I. C. R., who died at Newcastle on Tuesday the 23rd inst., in the 29th year of his age, took place here on Thursday last, under the auspices of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, he being an honorable member of Morrissey Rock Lodge, No. 256, Campbellton. The remains were interred in the church of England burying ground.

—Some time ago our Government prohibited the importation of rags as a necessary precaution against cholera. Similar action has now been taken in England, and in the U. S. a demand is being made for it. These rags are generally procured from disused filthy clothing and bedding, and are far and away more dangerous than the clothing which the poorest immigrants from European countries carry upon their backs. Danger from European rags is based on experience of the past. Our Government acted wisely in promptly recalling this fact to the attention of the sanitary authorities.—Empire.
